What is 101?

101 is the number to call when you want to contact your local police - when it's less urgent than a 999 call. 101 is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

When to call 101?

You should call 101 to report crime and other concerns that do not require an emergency response. For example, you should call 101 if:

- your car has been stolen
- your property has been damaged
- you suspect drug use or dealing in your neighbourhood

Or to:

- report a minor traffic collision
- give the police information about crime in your area
- speak to the police about a general enquiry

101 has been introduced as part of the government's wider work to improve access to the police, ease pressure on 999, and help to efficiently and effectively tackle crime and disorder.

What is the difference between 101 and 999?

You should continue to call 999 when it is an emergency, such as when a crime is in progress, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened. To contact the police for any other reason, call 101.

What does it cost to call 101?

Calls to 101 (from both landlines and mobile networks) cost 15 pence per call, no matter what time of day you call, or how long you are on the phone.

Why does it cost 15p to call 101?

The 15p cost of the call goes to the telephony providers to cover the cost of carrying the calls. The police and government receive no money from calls to 101.

Everyone calling the police for non-emergency matters now knows exactly how much a call will cost them, and can be assured of equal access whether they are on a pay-as-you-go mobile or a home landline.

Who will answer my 101 call?

Calls to 101 are answered by police officers and staff in the control room of the local police force. This ensures that staff with local knowledge can answer and deal with the calls and respond appropriately. You will not be put through to a large national call centre.

When you call 101, the system will determine your location and connect you to the police force covering that area. You will hear a recorded message announcing the police force you are being connected to. If you are on a boundary between two or more forces, the recorded message will give you a choice of which force to be connected to.

I am deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired, can I call 101?

Yes, you can textphone 18001 101.

What if English is not my first language?

Your local police have access to professional interpreters so they can quickly translate your call if you have difficulty speaking English.

What about reporting general nuisance or environmental issues?

You should continue to call your local council for things like:

- reporting graffiti
- dog fouling
- abandoned vehicles
- dumping and fly tipping
- vandalism

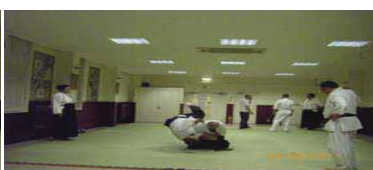

Councillors Page: The Kiln Farm planning application will go to committee on July 4th at the Civic Offices at 6-30 all are welcome to come to the meeting and though you may not be able to speak you can let the committee know you are against it just by being there.

Just a reminder that Abbey Road will be closed from the St Bede's end on 12th June for one day to work on the road it should be done outside of the peak travel hours. Over the next few months repair work will be done on several roads to repair after the bad winter damage we had.

The extension work to our Popley schools has started and will make some much needed places and facilities for our children.

I expect to be able to give you all some news on the Merton Rise by July or August. I think we all in agreement that the building should be finished before there is any thought of building 380 houses and 70 flats on the agricultural fields in Kiln Farm.

There is a proposal using some of the 106 developer money to increase route four to half hourly to the hospital but it will not surprise you to know that Stagecoach are objecting. I continue to fight for better bus services for everyone no matter where you live in the Basingstoke and Deane area. Jane 01256 819924

Popley West: Thank you for re-electing me to represent Popley West, Viv and David have joined Paul and me to make what I think will be a good hard working team for Popley. We are all working together on the objection to the Kiln Farm Fields planning application for 450 dwellings. It's not that we are against development, there are thousands on the waiting list. There are more suitable sites to build on and only 56 of people on the waiting list have said they want to live only in Popley. We already do not have enough school places for our children, though there is a massive scheme where extensions are being built at Marnel and Merton schools and it looks likely that Chineham Park school will be refurbished and reopened in September 2014. However there are no places for senior school. Hampshire County council is working with Spotlight to find new premises for them. We know that with over a 1,000 homes still to be built where there are already existing plans in Popley!

Popley East: As newly elected councillors for Popley East we wish to thank all those who supported us during the election. We enjoyed meeting lots of you as we visited all areas of the ward.

Many people spoke to us of issues concerning them, and we made a commitment to deal with these as soon as possible when elected. We are now gradually working through our list and will be organising petitions and the like on some of the community issues. For example an additional bus shelter on Carpenters Down opposite Falkland's Road is urgently required. The Council is starting a consultation exercise as part of an Environmental Renewal schemes programme for Tewkesbury Close and Popley Poets areas.

Whilst the proposals are fairly limited they will improve the areas concerned, provided they are carefully planned and meet with local residents' approval.

Flyers will be sent to all residents asking for input and ideas and the closing date for consultation is 11th June. Later there will be site meetings and we intend to get involved in these on your behalf.

Kiln Farm, we will continue to fight this application, working closely with Jane and Paul Frankum.

Popley Youth: The ‘E’ Word

As soon as we reach Secondary School, we always have the word “exams” hanging over our heads. However, we just disregard them, knowing we won’t have to face them for the next few years. Then the time flies and we’re having to do them within the next week – indicating the start of our lives in “the big wide world”.

Ask any teenager, they will tell you that exams are hard. Not necessarily the tests themselves, but the preparation that goes into predicting what questions we’ll be faced with. Revision is all about self-discipline – you need to find the right time to revise when you actually feel like it; if you’re just not in the right frame of mind, you’re not going to remember anything that you try and put into your head. Try to motivate yourself with chocolate or sweets for every thirty minutes you spend revising, every chapter you read or every video you watch.

We all fear the exam period – the results we get determine how our lives will play out, meaning that revision is as every bit important. Anyone with exams coming up – good luck. (And wish me luck too!)

BE WARNED: 1 in 5 wills are flawed



'The shocking revelation that 1 in 5 Wills are flawed, according to a recent report from the Legal Services Board, is scandalous' says Ben Holden, Wills and Probate solicitor at local Basingstoke law firm, Phillips. 'Many of the Wills in the survey contained 'basic errors' and a handful were so bad that they 'could not be executed'.

Why should that be? Well, currently anyone can help you make a Will, but beware: the Citizens' Advice Bureau has warned that increasing numbers of people have been conned by bogus Will writers with high pressure sales tactics offering cheap Wills in town centres or door to door.

'Making a Will is a must for everyone at some point in their lives' says Ben 'but selecting the best person is key to ensuring your assets go to the person(s) you choose.' Ben warns that low-cost or even free Wills could prove an expensive mistake. So if you are one of the 70% in the UK who hasn't made a Will, then Ben has this advice:

- **Do your homework.** Speak to friends and relatives who could recommend where they have received good service.
- **Check for qualifications.** It is surprisingly easy to set up a practice as a Will writer - you don't even have to be trained. So if anything goes wrong you might not have any come back. Solicitors are qualified, regulated and insured so you can always turn to the Legal Services Ombudsman if things don't turn out the way you want them to.
- **How much does it really cost?** If it looks too good to be true then it usually is, so be careful, many of my clients have been tempted by offers of a cheap Will predominantly from unregulated providers such as Will writers, only to come away having spent a lot more than they initially thought. So beware hidden costs!

'Families want peace of mind that their loved ones will be provided for' concludes Ben 'so it's in everyone's best interests that this report from the Legal Services Board calls for Will writing to be regulated to improve standards. If you haven't made a Will, now is the time to do so.'

Free NHS Health Checks Will Keep People in Basingstoke 'Running Like Clockwork'

Basingstoke residents aged between 40 and 74 are now able to have a free NHS health check as part of national programme to prevent cardiovascular diseases. The checks, which are being rolled out across the country, will identify and help to reduce a person's risk of coronary heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes and kidney disease.

Basingstoke residents will have now received letters inviting GP registered patients who are not known to suffer with a cardiovascular disease to attend a health check. The health checks will be held in a mix of locations, some will be invited to their GP surgery; others will be held in community setting. The check will calculate their estimated 10 year risk and suggest simple steps that can be taken to prevent the onset of these conditions.

With cardiovascular disease being one of the main causes of death in Hampshire, the free checks are expected to reduce the number of heart attacks and strokes each year and save lives of people in the area.

Robert Pears, Consultant in Public Health at NHS Hampshire said: "Everyone is at risk of developing heart disease, stroke, diabetes or kidney disease but, by taking early action, you can improve your health and help prevent these conditions from occurring. A health check only takes about 20 minutes of your time, and could really help you on the path to a more active, healthier life.

"We can recommend realistic and achievable steps that people can take which will make a difference to their lives. We can also suggest other support services that can help people to make simple, positive changes towards leading a more active, healthier life. However we do ask that people wait to receive an invitation letter about their health check, to enable Health Check services to manage demand."

The free NHS health checks, which will be offered to people aged between 40 and 74 every five years, take between 20 to 30 minutes and will involve a few questions about family history and lifestyle as well as a simple blood pressure and cholesterol test.

After the check, personalised advice about how to stay healthy and reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease will be offered according to the level of a person's risk.

Have you heard of.....Community Independence Team in Basingstoke

The Community Independence Team helps people over 55 maintain independence and reduce the likelihood of needing help from Hampshire County Council's Adult Services.

The team can help by providing you and your family with:

- specialist help if you are experiencing difficulties around the home, or with managing everyday activities, or if you are concerned about your health and wellbeing;
- assistance with linking you into appropriate health and community services;
- support, advice and guidance on a range of issues such as keeping warm, safe, fit and eating well; and
- support to know what social or leisure opportunities are available and how to access them .

Community Independence Team is funded and delivered through Hampshire Adult Services as part of its preventative approach to promoting individuals' independence, although you may have to meet costs associated with any community resources and services you choose to access.

If you need assistance with any of the above please ring Adult Services on **0845 603 5630**. The Agents who answer the call are trained to assess your requirements and may ask you for more details of your circumstances to ensure that your details are routed to the correct team.

My Journey Basingstoke

Introducing the “My Journey Basingstoke” Personal Travel Planning Project – coming to Chineham and East Popley in summer 2012

In 2011, Hampshire County Council was awarded funding from central government to deliver the Hampshire Sustainable Transport Towns project. This three-year project will introduce a package of transport initiatives and improvements within six towns in the north of the county, including Basingstoke. The “My Journey” travel awareness brand, shown above, has been developed for the project, and is being used as the public face of the various initiatives. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, local bus and rail operators are all project partners in the delivery of the planned transport improvements.

One initiative is to provide Personal Travel Planning (PTP) advice to households in target wards within three of the six towns. In Basingstoke we are planning to offer personal travel planning to 10,000 households over two years. This process involves actively promoting local walking and cycling routes, car-sharing and local bus and rail services to people that don’t currently use them, as well as advice on fuel-efficient driving.

Households who are willing to consider replacing certain car journeys with more sustainable alternatives will be encouraged to try using either local bus services, walking, cycling or car-sharing for a trial period, and during this challenge will be asked to keep a record of their experiences and feed these back.

This process will be delivered door-to-door by a team of trained travel advisors. The advisors will invite each householder to choose what sustainable travel information they would like to receive for journeys they regularly undertake. This information will then be provided to the householder along with some accompanying incentives, such as free bus tickets, to encourage them to try making the journey by local bus, on foot, by bicycle, by rail or by sharing a car journey or a combination of these.










Starting in June 2012, the County Council is planning to introduce this initiative in the north east of Basingstoke, initially to 4,650 households in the areas of East Popley and Chineham, under the name “My Journey Basingstoke”. The travel advisors will be working in these two neighbourhoods until late August 2012.

We hope the outcome from this project will be that more residents will consider the full range of travel choices available to them in Basingstoke, East Popley and Chineham, thereby helping households to choose the most suitable way of travelling for particular local journeys. The County Council has appointed WSP-PB, an experienced transport consultancy, to deliver this project.

BBQ Safety.

-  Keep a bucket of water, sand or a garden hose nearby in case of emergencies.
-  Only use barbecues in suitable and safe areas.
-  Set up your barbecue on level ground away from bushes, tents or other buildings and do not put it where you have to squeeze past it.
-  Wear suitable clothing and use appropriate long handled tools.
-  Make sure the coals are cool before you move the barbecue. Once cool, dispose of the ashes safely - never place them in dustbins.
-  Keep young children, animals and ball games away from the cooking area.
-  Be careful when cooking fatty foods, the dripping fat can cause the barbecue to flare up.
-  Never use petrol or paraffin to start or revive your barbecue. Use only recognised lighters or starter fuel, on cold coals and follow the instructions on the container/packet.
-  Never leave barbecues unattended.

Motor Vehicles in New Development

I have been asked to write a little piece to try and highlight the issues with SPEEDING and PARKING in Marnel Park.

Firstly just so you know a little about me, I am a resident of Marnel Park and a serving Police Officer although not locally..

First of all let's look at the

SPEEDING

Since Appleton Drive has completely opened there are a fair few drivers now treating it as their personal race track. The speed limit should be between 15-20mph depending on what Hampshire County Council set it as, but as a rule for a residential area it will be around that figure.....Some people can't seem to stick to this and are travelling in excess of 30mph.

Please bear in mind Appleton Drive is the main route for children walking to and from school. My question to the speeding drivers is.....How are you going to feel if you hit one of these children because you were 5 minutes late leaving for work?

How would you feel if it was your child hit by a car that was speeding? I have seen too many accidents, or collisions as they are called now, that could have been avoided if the driver(s) weren't speeding...IT COSTS LIVES.

Ask any Police Officer and they will tell you that they would sooner you drive safely and arrive late, rather than them have to go and tell a parent their child has been killed.

2nd Issue

PARKING

There have been several complaints from residents due to inappropriate parking in the area, especially around Appleton Drive, Gardner Close and Barrington Road.

For some reason residents would sooner park their cars away from their homes than use their parking bays, it is beyond me but there you go. Each property has allocated parking bays and/or driveways and in most cases this is for a minimum of two cars (depending on the size of property).

So why use the road rather than your bay? People seem to be under the impression that as it is a public road, then they can park where they like. WRONG....look up the ROAD TRAFFIC ACT 1988 and it clearly states where you can and cannot park.....CANNOT includes, BENDS, PAVEMENTS (especially not crossing points), ACROSS DRIVEWAYS and within 32ft OF A JUNCTION.

Even though the roads are at this time un-adopted it does NOT stop you committing parking offences. Pavements are for PEDESTRIANS and NOT CARS. As you will have noticed there are several pedestrian crossing points around the area with bobbled paving slabs, they are for partially sighted pedestrians...NOT FOR CARS TO PARK ON or IN FRONT OF. It is DANGEROUS.

If you have a driveway then PLEASE park on it. If you have to juggle the cars about for whoever is leaving first then DO IT....IT'S NOT DIFFICULT, PLEASE DON'T PARK ON PAVEMENTS THROUGH LAZINESS!

For those of you who park on bends, just be mindful, you are CREATING A BLINDSPOT for traffic and pedestrians.

My last point is a gentle nudge to drivers who don't use their bays. The first part of definition for a Road traffic Collision is "Owing To The Presence Of A Vehicle On The Road".....If there is a collision due to the fact 2 cars have hit each other after having to manoeuvre around your car....they could well be within their rights to drag you into their insurance claim if you have parked inappropriately.

Changes to Income Support for single parents

Income Support is a benefit for people with no income or a very low income. Up to now, you could get Income Support if you're a single parent and your child is under seven years old.

This is changing. From 21st May, you can only continue getting Income Support if you're a single parent and your child is under five years old. This will also mean you won't be able to make a new claim for Income Support if your child turns five after that date.

If you're a single parent under 18, you'll still be able to claim Income Support regardless of how old your child is. You may be able to continue getting Income Support for a limited period if you're in a certain type of full time education or training. You could also continue to get Income Support if, for example, you're a carer or a foster parent.

Otherwise, if you're claiming Income Support because you're a single parent and your child is over five, your Income Support will stop sometime between 21st May and 18th November this year. You will need to claim another benefit instead.

If you're looking for work, you can claim Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA). The Jobcentre Plus will write to you to invite you to an interview to explain what's required.

If you're not able to work because you're sick, you may be able to claim Employment and Support
