New look for Sentinel homes

Sentinel has worked closely with local residents throughout our Popley Islands regeneration programme. With phase four of our plans well underway, we are looking at ways we can upgrade the homes of our other customers in the area. We have put together some ideas to improve the appearance of the existing homes and enhance their energy efficiency at the same time.

We are planning to:

- Replace existing cladding with a modern, composite and easy-clean weatherboard
- Add render to the brickwork to improve the thermal efficiency of the homes
- Replace the doors to the bin storage area
- Repair external fascia, gutters and drainage pipes
- Improve the levels of insulation in the homes

The new design will look something like this:

A Lesson Learned

Leaving school – some people find that it's a hard thing to face, whereas for others it's fairly easy to confront. Some struggle to accept the change that they'll be experiencing within their new-found freedom; others, however, will rejoice it.

The build-up starts when you're a few weeks away from leaving – the excitement you feel, knowing that you can stay up late on so many nights and have a lie-in every single day, compels you to keep on going. But, then it hits you on that very last day – you won't see your friends all the time like you used to.

Sure, you can go and hang out with them, you can always stay in contact and so on – but it won't be the same routine you're used to. You know you're not going to see everyone when it's all over, except when the Prom arrives. The people you're used to seeing every single school day will be following their own paths into life, as will you.

I will admit, it was hard for me on my last day; so many people were upset, struggling to come to terms that everything was changing. On the last day, everyone was exchanging hugs and words of good luck – even if some people never spoke to one another much, they were all giving their best wishes.

School is something you take for granted – sure, it's good to meet up and socialise with your friends every day, but it was such a drag with all of the lessons, homework and exams that followed you everywhere. Only when you have to leave it all behind do you notice that you're going to miss every single bit of it.

Back in my first year of Secondary School, I was so fragile and weak – I would have been the perfect target for bullying. I was never a target though, nor was I ever bullied, because of some of the amazing people I knew. My friends changed me into the confident, out-going person I am now – they've given me a backbone and a voice. Their comments, their very influence, helped to inspire my very character; without school, and the friends that I gained with it, my life would have never changed.

I owe everything to these people – if you're someone I knew in school, thank you. Even if you've never spoken to me much, or you've never liked me a great deal, you've still played a role within my transformation. I wouldn't be here now, writing monthly articles within this magazine, without the confidence that I've gained through the friendships with you and so many others.

So now I take my first steps into the “big wide world” – my life just beginning. I will encounter new people, make new friends (as well as keep in contact with old ones) and keep on developing as an individual. Something I've learned recently will stay with me forever: Never take things for granted, they may very well be important in your life.

Alternative treatments?

It's hard to say which treatment is 'alternative', what is 'complementary' to medicine, and what is 'traditional'. In our multicultural community, acupuncture may be part of Traditional Chinese Medicine. Herbs are used widely, and there's a fine line between plants as food and plants as medicine.

Most health and healing work is done by ordinary people at home. Who taught you to clean your teeth, wash behind your ears and eat your greens? But sometimes it's necessary to seek professional help, as most do from our GPs.

Physiotherapy, chiropractic and osteopathy now have state registers. This means, for example, that no-one can call themselves an 'osteopath' if they are not on the General Osteopathic Council register (GOsC www.osteopathy.org.uk).

In the past, under UK commonlaw, anyone could be a bone setter, herbalist, healer, or homoeopath. Today, more groups are working towards state recognition, such as counsellors and psychotherapists.

Where to find out:

Your health centre may have information. Ask your health visitor, practice nurse or midwife. Contact registers for e.g. homoeopaths, medical herbalists, naturopaths.

Your local library will have books about therapies, and careers guidance about training. Once people learnt by apprenticeship with an established practitioner, but now most training involves several years of university level study and supervised practice before registration.

You can learn about the range of therapies from short courses in adult education, and further education courses offer specific skills training, say in massage.

Finding a practitioner

What sort of practitioner would be most helpful to you? In London, some places offer a 'referral' consultation: you outline your needs, and get advice about which therapy to try. Some psychotherapy organisations provide a referring service e.g. www.wpf.org.uk.

Personal recommendation by a friend or relation is the way most people find me for naturopathy and osteopathy. Most of my colleagues find this as well.

Questions to ask

Even if your best friend recommended a therapist, here are some questions to ask:

- What does your therapy do?
- How long have you been in practice?
- Where did you train?
- Are you registered?
- Are you insured?
- What happens in the first appointment?
- How long is the session?
- What does it cost?
- Will I need more than one session?
- What happens if I'm no better?

Less a therapy, more a way of life

Like many practitioners, I was a patient first. I consulted naturopath Mr H Leslie Harrison of York during my second pregnancy, wanting to know how to avoid needing iron injections! His easy to follow advice worked.

Later I trained at the British College of Naturopathy and Osteopathy (now of Osteopathic Medicine). I still learn with every patient who consults.

July marks the start of my 30th year in practice. I belong to the Incorporated Society of Registered Naturopaths <http://www.naturecuresociety.co.uk/practitioners.html> and the GOsC.

Harrison claims: 'There is nothing I shall ask you to do that I am not doing myself, or am prepared to do'. Eating and moving for high level health is what makes this a way of life. This contrasts with therapies where prescriptions are given, whether herbal, homoeopathic or pharmaceutical.

Popley West: The planning application to build another 450 dwellings in the Kiln Farm Fields, behind Appleton Drive, and by the side of Jersey and Guernsey Closes goes to committee this month on the 4th. 588 people signed the first petition not to build there and 222 on the second. There have been around 300 letters and emails to back up the view that they should finish building Merton Rise and the other sites that have planning permission already. They have chosen to ignore the wishes of the people of Popley and Sherborne St John who are united in their objection and opposition to this massive planning application for overdevelopment in our areas. There are other sites they could use and what is also shocking is there is no provision in the application for social renting, so not one person on the waiting list would be housed on this unwelcomed site. We hope that lots of residents come to the meeting in the Civic Offices at 6:30pm on 4th July to let the committee see that we are against this application at this time, and finish the other 1,000 buildings first before even considering more. If you have not already sent in a letter of objection there is still time to do so. The meeting will be at the Civic Offices at 6-30pm on Wed 4th July, please come to the meeting and show the strength of opposition Popley has for this development.

All vehicles kept off-road must be insured

New rules mean it's now an offence to keep a vehicle off a public road without insurance. This applies even if your vehicle is parked in your driveway, garage or kept away from your home address.

From the end of June 2011, if your vehicle appears to be uninsured, you will receive a letter telling you that you are uninsured. The letter will ask you either to insure your vehicle or check your insurance company has correctly entered your insurance policy details on the Motor Insurers' Bureau database (MIB).

If you fail to insure your vehicle within a specified time, you face:

a fixed penalty fine of £100, reduced to £50.00 if you pay early, having your vehicle clamped, seized and destroyed or being taken to court.

The new rules apply to most vehicles. However, you won't have to insure your vehicle if:

- you have a valid Statutory Off Road Notice (SORN) or
- your vehicle has been kept off a public road since before 1 February 1998 or
- your vehicle has been scrapped, stolen or exported and you have notified the relevant authorities
- your vehicle is in between keepers
- your vehicle is held in stock by an authorised motor dealer.

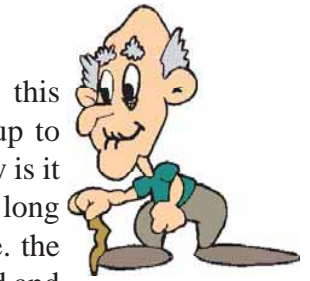

SCAM DEBT COLLECTION LETTERS

Mr T, from Hayling Island, who has dementia, received a threatening letter from a debt collection agency stating that he owed £300+. He was extremely worried as the letter stressed that if he did not pay within 10 days, he would be taken to court. He luckily told his daughter before paying and she contacted Trading Standards. Officers discovered that the letter was a scam and Mr T did not owe any money at all. The company was advised and have now amended their records.

ONLINE DATING SCAMS

In online dating scams, the victim is quickly groomed with declarations of true love over a period of weeks or months before being asked for money.

Fake photos are sent of attractive models or service personnel. (In reality, the scammer may not even be of the same sex that they claim to be). Once convinced that the love is mutual and genuine, the victim is asked to send money to help the "girlfriend or boyfriend" after they typically state they have been the victim of an assault, need urgent medical treatment or just need money to come to the UK to meet their "beloved", the victim.

Once the victim has been scammed out of as much money as possible the scammer will disappear. The victim is left, not only penniless, often feeling ashamed and foolish, but also alone to come to terms with the sudden loss of a person they felt they knew well and were deeply in love with.

Protect yourself from online dating scams by:

- never sending money to someone you meet online
- reporting any suspicions to the dating website

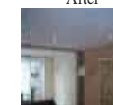

Police Blog For Popley

May 2012 (PCDC Blogs)

14th- I returned to work from holiday. I had a lovely week in La Palma, Canary Islands and I'm refreshed and ready to spring into action... Well after sifting through 120 emails and various other paperwork.

15th- This morning I dealt with a bail return for a suspected criminal damage. I also further arrested the male on suspicion of perverting the course of justice. The male admitted the damage and was charged with criminal damage and obstructing police.

Later I was back in work and crewed with PC Ian Hoile again. We assisted shift with patrols in the rural areas. We completed several enquiries.

Wilkinson's. I issued the female with a community resolution. The first time offender was very apologetic. The anti-wrinkle cream was returned to the shelf!

I also helped locate a missing child. Or rather, a defiantly late home child!

2nd to the 5th- Rest Days plus bank holiday.

6th and 7th- I attended Winchester Crown Court on both days for the start of a trial relating to a job I investigated last year.

8th, 9th and 10th- Rest Days.

In the past the local team has conducted letter drops in the relevant areas, and given advice to the car owners. Consideration will be given to issuing fixed penalties if matters cannot be resolved in other ways.

14th- Rest Day.

15th- I was on standby this evening for 'Football Patrols' in case there were issues in the town centre following the England match. As it turned out we beat Sweden 3-2 and all was well!

In other news: Patrols were conducted to prevent issues in Melrose Walk. One youth was taken home and spoken to with his parents following criminal damage and knock and run incidents. I also took a statement from a resident of Melrose Walk in relation to his car getting keyed. Work to identify suspect(s) is underway.

Also.... A letter has been drawn up to deliver to residents in a number of streets in Marnel Park. Residents will be requested to park more considerately. The letters will hopefully be delivered by the CSPOs as soon as possible. Failing that, I will deliver them myself, when I can.

Smoking Hazards

If you or members of your household smoke, then you need to be aware of the fire risks and take the appropriate steps to avoid them.

- Make sure you have a working smoke alarm on each floor level in your home.
- Double-check that cigarette ends, cigar butts and tobacco from your pipe are not still burning when you've finished with them. It's best to wet them and dispose of them in a metal bin outside the house.
- Use a proper ashtray - make sure it is heavy and can't tip over and is made of a material that will not burn.

Never...

- Smoke in bed - numerous deaths are caused when people fall asleep whilst still holding a lit cigarette.
- Tap your ash into a wastepaper basket!

Don't...

- Smoke if you feel sleepy - or if you've been drinking or taking prescription drugs. Again, you could fall asleep whilst holding a lit cigarette.
- Leave a lit cigarette, cigar or pipe unattended - as they burn down they can end up on the carpet and start a fire!
- Leave matches or lighters lying around where children can reach them.
- Leave your ashtray on the armrest of your chair. At the end of the day, make sure you empty them outside in a metal container.

Want to give up smoking?

If you would like to give up smoking you can:

- Visit the NHS smokefree website (opens new window) or
- call Quitline on 0800 00 22 00, or visit the quit smoking website

Did you know?

- Smoking and smoking materials are the second biggest cause of fires in the home.
- Cigarettes can burn at temperatures of over 700°C.
- Every three days someone dies from a fire caused by a cigarette.
- You can buy child-resistant lighters and containers for match boxes.

Grass, wood and heath fires start when your attention stops! Never throw cigarette ends out of windows.

LOANS: UP-FRONT PAYMENTS

Loan scams happen when a victim is asked to pay an upfront fee for a loan.

Real life case study

Mr L, a disabled man from Petersfield answered a telephone call out of the blue offering him a fast loan of £10,000 and was delighted to be told that his telephone application had been instantly approved regardless of his poor credit history. Before he received the loan, he was asked for an upfront fee of £400 to cover insurance for the loan. He borrowed the money from his elderly mother and paid the loan company by Ukash money transfer voucher bought from his local convenience store. He did not hear from the company again and the loan was never received. The company could not be traced.

The Consumer Credit Act 1974 provides that a credit-broker may charge no more than £5 for services if the consumer does not enter into a relevant agreement within six months of an introduction to a prospective source of credit or hire. If the broker has already charged more than £5 for his services in these circumstances, the excess must be refunded to the consumer upon request. However, tracing the company involved to request a refund can be difficult compounded by the fact that the only telephone numbers given are often charged at premium rate.

Payday loan companies have promised to improve the way they sell credit to borrowers under voluntary guidelines agreed with the government. Lenders have until 25 July 2012 to add new commitments to their existing codes of practice. These include a promise to increase transparency about loan repayments so borrowers are not surprised by hidden payments, robust credit and affordability assessments to make sure loans are suitable for the borrower, and more help for customers in financial difficulty by freezing charges and interest.

Silver Neighbour

Last year some of the residents of Popley helped me to pilot a free test for assessing your own risk of Alzheimer's disease. Go to the charity www.foodforthebrain.com if you want to know about the end product, suffice to say 117,000 people have now taken that test and can either take steps to stop it progressing, or can relax in the knowledge that their risk is low. However, in the course of the pilot study I went into 50 people's homes and talked at length with them. I had a shock. I hadn't realised some of the problems of living in the UK in your 80s, 70s and even 60s and 50s, especially for people living on their own and in particular for widows who were used to their husbands managing things like the boiler service, electrics or clearing the gutters. They, in particular, don't want strangers in their homes, and worry about being ripped off by tradespeople they find on the internet. Fear of falling or being ill and not being found was another big worry, and then there was the issue of loneliness. If you can't get out and about, and you don't have family nearby, you can go for days without seeing another person. That was a surprise and I don't want to be like that when I am older. We have to do better for our senior citizens.

I come from a technology background and so I set to thinking about how technology could be used to help with these problems and I came up with an idea. It involves technology that no-body need fear because it is so simple to use, and a community co-ordinator - someone in the community who knows what is going on. Jane Frankum would be a good example – there's very little going on in Popley that she doesn't know about.

So now I need to test my idea on some volunteers. Firstly I need to speak to people who are over 60, living alone, and without a supportive family nearby, to test my idea, and in the future hopefully I'll need about 6 people to test the prototype. I have called it Project Silver Neighbour.
