### New Community Centre, Carpenters Down Popley

AS you may know, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council are planning to build a new community centre on the site of the old Popley North Community Centre at Carpenters Down. The money for this Centre is allocated within the Council's capital scheme and will be available from April 1994.

During the next year the council will be holding public meetings and consultations with local community groups to find out what is needed in the new centre. These public meetings will be advertised in the local press. Plans will be drawn up during the year, ready to start building in April 1994.

It is likely that a steering committee will be formed from local people working in conjunction with officers from Basingstoke and Deane.


### Chineham House Redevelopment

# The Revitalised Landscape in Popley

THE Housing Department felt it would be desirable to improve the landscape of Popley Islands and so a scheme was born by the Community Services Department last year. Works were proposed to Pitcairn Close, Ascension Close, Madeira Close, Cayman Close, Faroe Close, Maldive Road, Orkney Close and Lundy Close.

On 14 October 1992 a Public Information Exercise took place at Popley Two Meeting Hall, Madeira Close, to which approximately 500 residents were invited. A total of 133 people visited the display between 11 am and 7pm and the comments of those people resulted in various amendments being made to the scheme.

On 4 January 1993 the first phase began with the rebuilding and repair of various walls. Phase Two consists mainly of the following types of work: Removal of shrubs from some roadside plantings back by 2.5 metres from the highway to improve sight lines and replanting with new shrubs with an ultimate height of less than one metre. All remaining shrubs in these beds will be pruned to about 3 metres above ground.

New plantings of trees and shrubs within the estate to soften views, screen undesirable features and integrate the estate with its surroundings.

The work will be completed soon. Whilst the work is proceeding there is bound to be some disruption. This of course will be minimised but you are asked to be tolerant and patient, the end result will be worth it. I,however, there is a particular problem please contact the Project Officer on Basingstoke 844844 ext. 2607 during normal officer hours and he will try to deal with it as swiftly as possible.

### Popley Two Residents Association

POPLEY TWO Tenants Association, as it was known at the time of inauguration, has done remarkably well during its seventeen years serving the local community. I joined the Association early in 1976 following the Steering Committee's hard work to get things off the ground, the official opening being in October 1975. We canvassed house-to-house for membership and did extremely well in obtaining a total of 308 members. Thereafter, it was a terrific slog to enrol committee members. In fact, for quite a time committee members came and went in no time at all. But as is commonly known there were always the regular stalwarts prepared to achieve the goal set for them. Quite often we found many ordinary members prepared to help at all our functions. At our AGM in 1986 we had a record number of committee members, 26 in total. By the next AGM those numbers diminished to 18 which was good by previous standards.

Despite the ups and downs and one particular year ending up slightly in the red, we feel the community has benefited in many ways.

Our first and one of many big events organised was the Jubilee Party we gave about 350 children on Tuesday 7 June 1977. Each child went home with a Jubilee Mug and happier for the good time they had. We were able to use the car park next to the Barbican public house. John Hunt of Everest School kindly loaned us many tables and chairs for the event. Following this event we still managed to hold a summer fete on the dunes behind our meeting hall.

The highlight of all our summer fetes has been the contest for Popley Princess. A shield is hanging in our hall with all past winners' names engraved upon it. One of our proudest moments was when our very first Popley Princess, Anne Chick in 1976, was crowned Basingstoke Carnival Queen in 1984. Further to this Anne actually opened our fete that year and crowned the new Popley Princess, Lisa Hull. And even further to this, we took first prize and the Challenge Cup with our carnival float, the theme being 'The Wedding of the Princess and the Toy Soldier''.

We have many successes under our belts in Basingstoke carnivals. We took a cup for 'Star Wars' in 1979, and again in 1980 with the theme of 'King Neptune'. Real seaweed was used on this float, collected by some committee members from the seaside. We had further successes in 1982 and 1983 with First Prizes in our group. In total we have had five Firsts, including the Challenge Cup and come Second on two other occasions. The pleasure in achieving all this is great but mostly we hope our endeavours day in and day out are just as satisfying to the members at large as they are to our committee.

But it is not only the annual events that keep us going. The day-to-day functions are the backbone of our Association. Our playgroup can quite often proudly boast of maximum numbers of children and a wide range of equipment, plus good staff managed by Brenda Williams. There are now one or two vacancies due to children reaching school age.

Every Monday afternoon, the 'Over 50s' Club' meets in the hall. They have a good ole natter, tea and biscuits and finish up playing Bingo. Anyone over fifty years are welcome to go along and join in the fun, just ask for Les or Jean, they will soon settle you in. Times are 1.30pm to 3.30pm or contact Les Padfield on 468679. Monday evenings there is Bingo in the hall for all members over 18. We have refreshments on sale, hot and cold drinks, crisps etc. We can still take on new members, so come along and enjoy not only a couple of hours of fun but maybe win a few pounds into the bargain. 



# Wellfield Farm

I enjoy going to raves 'cos like you go to the pub and you drink fifteen pints, fifteen pints yea, and you come out and you have a fight. You go to a rave and you are dancing shoulder to shoulder with everyone you don't even know and most people think well this is a crime but it aint. It's because it's well it's a wicked buzz, if you know what I mean, just being there it's just all right you know what I mean? Knowing people do drugs but it's up to them I'm just saying that I'm not one of the ones that do drugs so if they want to take drugs it's up to them, but I'd rather go to a Rave than go to a pub and spend fifteen quid.

# **A Cruse Around Basingstoke**


THERE is, at last, a Cruse around the area of Basingstoke and Deane. It's not the sort of cruise that takes you to exotic places in bright sunshine with deck quoits and an entourage of seagulls. Ours is the sort of Cruse that steers you gently out of more troubled waters, and steers you back on the road of recovery when someone special dies. The full title of the organisation is Cruse Bereavement Care and our branch is part of a national network. You may be slightly puzzled about its name . . .

In 1959, Margaret Torrie, wife of the late Dr Alfred Torrie, was trying to find a name for the group of widows she had brought together in Richmond. Publicity in the national press had drawn attention to the group and had disclosed a considerable need all over the country. There were, it seems, three million widows in our midst. Naming the group was difficult. No widow wanted attention drawn to her personal situation, although she desperately wanted support and encouragement. There was a strong feeling against using the word 'widow' meaning 'empty' - from the French word 'vide'. The idea behind the work was to be positive and outward looking - a beginning again.

Out of the blue came the idea of 'Cruse', centred on the story in the Old Testament - 1 Kings 17 - about a widow and her son being helped, not only over a particular problem at the time, but also to begin a new life. The widow shared the last of her food with a passing stranger without promise or thought of any return. The outcome had that touch of transforming magic that true generosity always produces. The record says she never lacked again. "The barrel of meal and the cruse of oil were replenished according to her need." A Cruse, in fact, is an earthenware vessel holding oil.

So Cruse was adopted as a fitting name for an organisation built on the generosity of concerned people and on the giving, within their means, of widows and bereaved people themselves. Since those early days the organisation has served the needs of thousands of grieving families and widows through its network of branches. Our aim here in Basingstoke is to help all bereaved people, through eventually by providing opportunities for social contact. The steering group of the Basingstoke Branch has worked hard for more than a year, setting up the mechanics and training counsellors. It now operates from Chute House in Church Street where coffee mornings are held every Wednesday between 10.00am and Noon. We can be contacted on 331551 and will respond to your call as soon as we can.


# Chineham Park Rangers FC



# RSPCA

MANY people in Basingstoke will have browsed through the Livestock and Pet section of the Gazette and seen the advertisements for the RSPCA. The number to ring for dogs is that of the Head Co-Ordinator of the RSPCA dog rehoming team Shirley Vincent or Chief Cod to her group of keen and eager volunteers.

The team of nine work hard to rehome as many unwanted or ill treated dogs as possible, but only to the right homes. Many people want dogs but often for the wrong reasons - to please the children or to guard the house. To ensure that our dogs go to good homes, all the potential owners are visited and although there are a number of strict conditions when adopting a dog, including compulsory neutering, insurance and dog training classes. A very important point of the visit is to ascertain which dog is suitable for that person.

All our dogs are assessed in their own environment for general temperament and ability to mix with children. We provide foster homes for dogs in emergencies where we can further assess them and if necessary instill some previously lacking discipline. As Basingstoke is a poor relative of the RSPCA we have no kennels to take dogs and our foster homes are frequently bursting at the seams but we still manage to maintain a non destruction policy. In fact, enormous amounts of money are paid out in vet bills for our dogs in our care. Perhaps this would be a good time to mention that donations will always be gratefully accepted. Fundraising is a regular feature in our monthly dog team meetings and our biggest venture yet was a huge fete at John Hunt School on 19 June 1993. We continue to look for ways to raise money and to make this world a happier and safer place for our dogs. We have recently registered two members of our team to perform micro-chipping of dogs so that they can be identified if lost or

stolen.

### in conversation

An interview with early Popley "Pioneer" -Mr David Cockerill of Selby Walk by Cal Webster - Area Youth Worker Hampshire County Council. Which Popley people would you like to see interviewed for future editions? Suggestions to the Editor please.

Dave Cockerill is a senior member of the Popley area having lived here nearly twenty-four years. From the age of 39 until last year Dave has always been involved in part-time voluntary youth work, in addition to his main job. He is a member of St Gabriel's Church in Tewkesbury Close.

#### **ARRIVAL ON POPLEY**

How did Dave and his wife Violet end up on Popley? "By something of chance", is Dave's reply.

Many of the builders on the estates (including Popley) at the time were having constant trouble with certain appliances in the houses. The problem became so acute that they rang Dave's firm and asked for a permanent engineer from their firm to be based in Basingstoke. The engineer who was lined up for the job told the firm at the last minute, that he couldn't drive! Consequently, Dave was asked to do the job instead. Dave drove Violet, his wife, down from London, saw the new estate, the space there was a "green belt" compared to London and decided there and then to stay. This was in September 1969, whereupon they moved into the same house on Selby Walk that they live in today.

#### **POPLEY HISTORY AND MEMORIES**

Dave tellsus that the first four houses to be built on Popley were on Tintern Close around 1966/67. Also, that where St. Gabriel's stands now, was an old Army camp, comprising "Nissen" huts, all iron framework and concrete slab, which though an eyesore and a danger were not demolished until around 1980.

#### A REWARDING TIME

Around March 1982, Dave heard about a post that was to become available at Park Prewett Psychiatric Hospital, as a store keeper. He decided to apply because he envisaged an opportunity to have input into peoples lives who for one reason or another were struggling.

Dave never really saw the job as being, "just a storesperson", because as he says in his own words, "I don't think I have many talents, but if God gave me one, it is the ability to make people smile and be cheerful". It was probably the obvious desire to use that talent, that made the hospital administrators choose Dave from over 150 applicants.

Dave retired from this job in May last year (1992) and would affirm to anyone that it was the best ten years of his working life.

#### SOME STIGMA, HISTORY AND AN AMAZING RE-UNION

Owing to Park Prewett's work as a psychiatric hospital, there was a certain amount of stigma that would surface from time to time. Dave felt this was a great pity, as becoming mentally ill can happen to anyone in effect. An example of this stigma, was that some parents would stop their children attending the hospital on youth club visits. Most Popley people will know that Park Prewett is due to close in two or three years time.

However, Dave recounts that the history of the site is a lot longer than many realise. There has been a hospital in that location since 1904 to this day. In those days it was referred to as, "the asylum". In the war there was a burns unit stationed there which mainly treated Canadian soldiers.

Dave then, got to know the patients in Park Prewett really well, and still goes back there regularly to visit them. One day whilst Dave was still working at the hospital a lady from "finance" came up to the ward Dave was working on and gasped in amazement as she recognised Dave from Providence Hall in Kilburn. She had been a member of the junior club there when she was about eight and Dave was around twenty-one. Naturally, there followed a good deal of animated conversation about the good times on few resources and the service such clubs used to provide for the community, which in some ways can only be measured accurately when looking back in retrospect.

#### YOUTH WORKER AMONGST POPLEY YOUNG PEOPLE

Dave's youth work on Popley needless to say started soon after he arrived on the estate, and has in the main been with the "junior" and "inters" age ranges. All of it has been done under the name of St. Gabriel's Church and spanned the years when the church was first based in a caravan on Popley One!

Later on there was a sharing of premises with St. Bede's Catholic School, whereupon St. Gabriel's would file in after St. Bede's had finished their worship.

The youth clubs were always held at Merton Junior School, as was the Sunday School for a time. All manner of activities were engaged in though Dave remembers the girls reaching the Southern area five-a-side championships as one of the highlights.

#### DAVE'STHOUGHTSON "COMMUNITY"

Looking back, Dave remembers how people certainly seemed more aware of the need for community spirit 25 years ago, because everything and everyone was "new"! It was probably a reality that people worked harder at relationships, because there was more necessity and "incentive", and a realisation that everyone was a "pioneer" of sorts, making history together. Certainly those people must have been partly responsible for shaping the future of the estate as it is now.

There's no way Dave would want to pretend they got everything right either. For example he can remember how after being on Popley for about 3 or 4 years, all Popley 1, 2, 3 and 4 were asked to vote on community centre provision.

"The majority of people, including myself, voted in favour of each area having our own little centre, rather than a more central, substantial community centre for the whole of Popley. Perhaps we thought it may have been more accessible, less intimidating, to have this kind of provision. Maybe it was right for that time, but not for now, because it's evident we need something larger and more purpose built. On a practical level, simply for the facilities, and on a community work level, something to pull people together and create a "heart". There are no shortage of groups on Popley, each good at doing their own thing. It's harder to look to interests other than your own though, and heave yourself out of the isolation that working in a "vacuum" brings.

It's hard to say how it happens for certain, but in the "shake down" over the years what emerges is that groups become isolated. Hopefully a centre such as the one described would engender a policy of working together and sharing for the good of the whole estate and the many clearly defined groups and individuals in need of so many things. I'm sure the high unemployment on the estate is contributory to the poor health statistics and the divorce rate.

None of this means it's unhealthy to harbour ambitions for your own group, points out Dave.

"For my part, seeing our church grow in number and facility-wise is close to my heart, but so is the way we integrate with our community".

It's been interesting to catalogue just a few of the initiatives Dave has been involved in on behalf of Popley. One factor remains unchanged in Dave's view. When a group is starting something from scratch there is only one attitude and that is the right attitude. Communities are built on the Dave Cockerill's of this world, the ones who can smile and encourage others even though their own hearts might be breaking.

Any "payback" comes in the form of the people who still keep in touch. In Dave's case its folk from the old youth clubs in London and on Popley. For me, the benefits were having met a humble man who is prepared to labour for scant reward and who makes others feel good.

Thanks Dave, for sharing some of your experiences with us.

# Traffic Speeds

### Popley Way to Carpenters Down

ON this page of POPLEY MATTERS you will see the reproduction of the national road safety campaign with the slogan KILL YOUR SPEED - NOT A CHILD. It is especially the research statistic that "when children are hit by a car at 40mph most are killed" which I strongly feel cannot be ignored in relation to local conditions. The Government recently launched its £2.3 million TV campaign which aims to cut children's road deaths.

My observation of traffic in Popley has convinced me that the 40mph limits should be reduced to 30mph, particularly when you consider the schools and the residential home for the elderly people situated in the area. Action should also be taken to reduce limits to 20mph outside all schools in Basingstoke, as a general rule of safety. In my wish to be preventative and pro-active, I have discussed these concerns with Headteachers, The Warden of Abbey Court and Andrew Hunter MP, all of whom have been most supportive.

The outcome, thanks to Mrs Lois Kopp, Petition Co-ordinator, has resulted in over 700 signatures, which were handed over to Councillor Dudley Keep, Chairman of Hampshire County Council, outside John Hunt of Everest School on 5 November 1992. Confirmation has now been received that the County's Safety Engineering Team is engaged in a study of accidents and Traffic Officers are carrying out a traffic count using MITRON equipment, which will provide accurate records of vehicle speeds along Popley Way and Carpenters Down. We trust that common sense will prevail, as the safety of all residents, young and old alike, is of paramount importance. **ERNEST BOURNE**
