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

Dear Editor; My favourite part of "Popley Matters" is the Old Codger, and although I was born after the war, I was brought up on some of the food of the era, so how about some of the old recipes of the time. I still get "Skirt", for cooking you can now get it at Morrisons, and my Gran used to make a lovely "Potato Peeling Cake", even though it is many years since I had some, it used to be really lovely.

I expect quite a few of your readers remember the old ways of cooking, good healthy cheap foods, cooked well.

Mind you, I could not manage tripe or pigs bits, ugh! Lynne from Abbey Road.

**Editor; I sent this message on to the Old Codger and he sent this reply with his thanks to Lynne for her kind message,**

Old Codger's reply; An old favorite as they were always cheap or you could scrimp them when I was a kid, this was the old fashion apple pie, very easy to make.

1lb apples, 2oz Demerara sugar, ¼ pint water, 8oz short crust pastry i.e. 8oz of flour, put peeled apples in a dish, with the sugar, cover with the pastry mix making sure the edge of the dish is moist so the pastry will not stick on cooking, crimp edges, cover with egg white and a sprinkle of sugar, then bake in a moderate oven for 35 minutes till fruit is well cooked, you can use all types of fruit in this pie gooseberries, plums, you can pick black berries, or damsons. The list is endless but cheap, summery and filling, if the pastry is cooked before the fruit turn down the heat so it will not burn. Have with ice cream or custard lovely.

**Editor's reply; My dear Mother taught me how to make things go further and**

***how to make a good nutritious meal out of scraps nothing was wasted. When cooking mince add some porridge oats, makes it go a long way and is good for you too. My Dad was in the army so we were posted abroad and I got a taste for exotic foods but I don't know how to cook them. 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## Good News from the Early Education and Childcare Unit.....

From 1 April 2006, all three and four year olds can have more free, part-time nursery education. The entitlement to sessions of 2½ hours per session for up to five sessions per week stays the same. But the number of weeks increases from 33 to 38 – the equivalent of schools. Some pre-schools and private nursery schools will need a little time to make the adjustment if they can – but they will make it clear to parents who use them. Any unused weeks though cannot be made up elsewhere.

The dates when three year olds children become eligible stays the same - so that is 1 September, 1 January and 1 April after their birthday.

## HAMPSHIRE SCHOOLS COLLABORATE

Two Hampshire County Council schools are to embark on an innovative partnership project aimed at widening opportunities for pupils ensuring the best outcomes for them in line with the aims of the Children Act.

The collaboration, the first of its kind in the county, will see headteacher, Jeffery Threlfall of Wildern School in Hedge End working alongside headteacher Lesley Phillipson and her senior leadership team at John Hunt of Everest Community School in Basingstoke.

Mr Threlfall will act as an executive headteacher, providing support and sharing his expertise and experience with Mrs Phillipson as part of a three-year collaboration aimed at developing learning opportunities for staff and pupils at her school.

Pupils at John Hunt have already been benefiting from the partnership, taking part in lessons with teachers from Wildern School and will be making use of the Hedge End school's groundbreaking e-learning initiative. Wildern's virtual learning environment enables pupils to access a range of curriculum resources and tutorials at the click of a computer mouse. Wildern School has also been involved in a project which is accessible not only to a number of schools in the county but also nationally through a portal created for the Specialist Schools and Academies Trust website. The school has also recently created an additional portal for the SSAT for their e-mentoring project which will enable pupils to be mentored prior to their GCSE examinations.

Staff and pupils at John Hunt are looking forward to the completion of a £25m building project which will provide them with state of the art premises on a brand new purpose-built site near to its present Popley Way site. It is expected the new school will be ready for occupation by September 2007. Information and communications technology will be a major feature of the new school in addition the building will have community facilities including a health and fitness suite and floodlit pitches as well as a purpose built youth provision.

Both headteachers are looking forward to working together to take the school into a new phase.

Lesley Phillipson said: "I am looking forward to working with Jeffery and developing learning opportunities for pupils and staff here at John Hunt. The pupils are already benefiting from the link with Wildern, they have enjoyed lessons with Wildern teachers and will gain from the experiences with the e-learning initiative. They are enthusiastic about this link and we are looking forward to building on that here at John Hunt."

Jeffery Threlfall has 10 years experience as a headteacher and has been praised by Ofsted for his strong leadership and vision at Wildern which was judged an outstanding school by government inspectors earlier this year. He has already undertaken work to support schools across Hampshire by sharing his expertise and good practices. He said: "I am very pleased to have the opportunity to collaborate with John Hunt School in order to support the headteacher, staff and governors in raising standards and outcomes for pupils. Projects are already underway which include using the capacity at Wildern School to support a working partnership on teaching and learning."

The partnership is being fully supported by the County Council. Councillor David Kirk, Hampshire County Council's Executive Member for Education, said: "I am confident that this unique collaboration will prove extremely beneficial to pupils and staff alike. It presents an excellent opportunity for teachers and pupils from John Hunt to share in the expertise and experience of the Wildern staff and to build upon this to develop their school, raising standards and creating opportunities for enhanced learning which will be complemented by the new building currently being built for them. This is an exciting time for all at John Hunt and I wish them well for this pioneering project."

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

The Group Annual meeting for Parents on 13<sup>th</sup> June was well attended and we are pleased to welcome David Spokes as the new Group Chairman and thank him for taking on the role. The Group is still in need of a Secretary to record meetings held about every 6/8 weeks and co-ordinate arrangements for fund-raising. Other members of the committee are: Mike Mullender (Treasurer), Beverley Stonehouse, Carol Rose, Sue Shillitto and Sue Keetch with Pat Brown and section leaders holding ex-officio appointments.

Prior to the Annual Meeting, the Beaver Colony performed a pageant depicting highlights from the section's history which celebrates its 20th Anniversary this year having been nationally incorporated in 1986. The cub section performed a humorous sketch 'If I were not a cub scout, a .... I would be' with interesting innovations! The Chief Scout Silver Award was presented to Lauren Brooks by the District Commissioner, Bob Lock.

The cubs had a rip-roaring, not too hot, day at Gilwell Park on 18<sup>th</sup> June to celebrate 90 Years of Cub Scouting. Over 10,000 young people attended (about 300 of which came from the Basingstoke area) and all Packs were urged to take a Birthday Cake. What a day - lots of action and adventure and some very tired young people and leaders on the journey home! The Beavers Colony joined in Hampshire's Big Beaver 20<sup>th</sup> Birthday Party the following Sunday and they too had a busy day. Nine Beavers attended the Annual District Beaver Scout Sleepover themed on the Jungle Book.

Although celebrating its 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this year Beaver section's roots go back to 1963 when a group of 'pre-cub age children' called 'Little Brothers', started in Dromore, Co. Down. It was almost 20 years later, in 1982, that the Scout Association introduced the original Beaver uniform of a grey sweatshirt and turquoise scarf, however. Records confirm that Jan Saunders was one of the first to see the opportunities for young people in Popley and she ran a 'pre-cub section' group based in the Air Scout HQ (the old black hut!) in 1983 but it was not until 1994 that the Air Scout Group formally registered its first Beaver Scout Colony led by Sue Keetch.

The scouts section have been experimenting recently making 'rockets' from plastic bottles and competition to see which will go the furthest (not necessarily in an upwards direction however!)

## Another First For Borough's Over 55s' Forum

Althorp House in Northamptonshire is the destination for the first-ever coach trip organised by the borough's 'Young at Heart' Over 55s' Forum - and people are being urged to book fast as tickets are selling like hot cakes!

The day trip to the famous stately home of Lord Spencer will take place on Tuesday 1st August and is the first in a series of excursions planned for the summer taking in beautiful and historical hotspots around the country.

Basingstoke and Deane's 'Young at Heart' Over 55s' Forum was set-up in September 2004 to give a voice to the borough's older residents – and it's been gaining momentum ever since. Member numbers are continually increasing and the forum already has a successful International Older People's Day under its belt. Lawrie McMenemy MBE has agreed to be its patron and work has even begun on a charter for the older person.

Chairman of the forum Maurice Lay said: "Althorp House is steeped in tradition and history and the trip includes a full tour as well as entry to the award-winning exhibition 'Diana: a celebration'.

"We've already sold over half the tickets so people will need to act quickly. Tickets cost £22 per person – there's no booking fee - and this includes the cost of the coach and admission to Althorp House.

"We're also discussing ideas for more short day trips in the future and would welcome any suggestions."

The forum is supported by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and the council's Cabinet Champion for Older People Cllr Cecilia Morrison said: "Members expressed an interest in visiting this and other places in the UK – so the forum has arranged this trip and the transport to give our older residents what they want.

What is anti-social behaviour?

The government says anti-social behaviour is 'acting in a manner that causes or is likely to cause; harassment alarm or distress to people...'

Anti-social behaviour affects different people in different ways. For some people it means living next door to nuisance neighbours, for other people it is about graffiti, litter or abandoned cars on the street.

In Basingstoke and Deane we include other nuisance activities such as:

- Vandalism · Harassment including racial or homophobic harassment · Street drinking · Reckless or dangerous riding or motorbikes and scooters · Fly tipping · Noise nuisance · Abuse and intimidation

The Council works closely with a range of agencies to support local people tackle anti-social behaviour. Basingstoke and Deane will not tolerate anti-social behaviour.

What we are doing about it?

The Council and the Police, work with other agencies such as Housing Associations, and Community Safety Officers

We are aware that local residents are concerned about some people's lack of respect for where they live and the people living around them.

We take your concerns seriously and can use a range of interventions and powers to resolve these problems with you to make Basingstoke and Deane a safer place to live.

The powers that can be used to deal with anti-social behaviour include:

- fixed penalty notices and on the spot fines · prosecution · seizure of equipment and vehicles · termination of tenancy agreements · issuing of Anti-social Behaviour Orders (ASBOs) and Acceptable Behaviour Contracts (ABCs) · Mediation · Closure Orders (Class A Drugs) · Dispersal Orders

What you can do to help us

Please help us by reporting anti-social behaviour as follows:

Crime and Disorder

- In an emergency always ring **999** where there is the likelihood of immediate injury, damage to property, fire or for crimes in progress.
- If you have information about a non-emergency crime, want to discuss problems with anti-social behaviour or to pass information to your local Beat Manager call **08450454545**.
- If you wish to report information about a crime anonymously then this can be done through Crimestoppers on **0800 555111**

Anti-social Behaviour

- Problems to do with noise nuisance, flytipping, graffiti and abandoned vehicles can be reported to the Council's Environmental Health Team on **01256 844844** – simply ask for the duty officer.
- For information, support or action on problems that you have identified or experienced to do with anti-social behaviour, call the Anti-social Behaviour Team on **0845245** who is available to work with you to resolve the problem. You can download information at [www.basingstoke.gov.uk/community](http://www.basingstoke.gov.uk/community). Information will be treated confidentiality and measures are in place that can ensure your identity is protected when reporting anti-social behaviour.
- Hampshire County Council Accredited Community Safety Officers (ACSOs) also patrol Basingstoke and Deane and are available to respond to problems with low level anti-social behaviour. The ACSOs can be contacted on **0845 6001747**.

YOU CAN NOW REPORT PROBLEMS 24/7 TO THE NEW SINGLE NON-EMERGING NUMBER 101

Remember services can only tackle problems that are reported to them by the public. If you do not call then no record is kept of the extent of the problem

Every little helps as they say with the water shortages. Well everthing is wilting - plants in my garden that is! So heres a few tips watering while we can't use a hose. All my ideas came from when we lived in Cornwall as kids. We had cold water from a spring which tended to run very slow during the summer months, and a septic tank which my skinflint Dad hated paying to have emptied. At the time we thought it was a pain saving water - but the experience is paying off now when we have water meters and hosepipe bans here

1. Try not to water during the day while the sun is on your plants. It burns the leaves and evaporates as fast as you water. Instead water before the sun gets onto them, allowing it to soak down before the heat gets up, or in the evening while the plants have all night to grab what they can. Watch out for slugs and snails if you water late as they come out as the sun goes down - specially in damp areas.
2. Save kitchen water to throw on the lawn in the evening or when the sun is off it. The dregs in the kettle, water from rinsing through cups or washing your hands - can all be used as long as harsh chemicals aren't involved. Use this for your flower pots and baskets too.
3. Plants dry out in pots faster than in the ground. Dense planting helps to slow up the evaporation in both cases. Try to position them where they get less direct sunlight during the mid and late afternoon when the temperatures are highest.
4. If you have a fish pond, it needs regular maintenance during the summer months to keep the fish healthy. When doing a partial water change, siphon it into buckets or bowls to use on your plants. During the current hosepipe ban, you are allowed to use a hose for fishpond but not for other ornamental ponds without fish.

Looks like a storm could be brewing - I'm off to put buckets under my leaky guttering you never know! **Julie Johnson**

# Home Safety Visit

The Community Safety Team of Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service have the aim of fitting a smoke detector in every home in Hampshire by 2010. In order to achieve this aim, they are currently being very targeted in their approach to fitting smoke detectors and undertaking home fire safety visits in homes of the more vulnerable people, such as the elderly, people on lower incomes, people from minority ethnic groups, people with disabilities and families with young children.

You may have heard about the tragic fire in Petersfield recently where fire crews from Petersfield were called to a fire in a private semi-detached property. The first crew arrived within eight minutes to tackle the severe fire on the ground floor of the property, followed by crews from Horndean, Waterlooville and Cosham and another crew from Petersfield. The Command Support Unit from Portchester was also mobilised to the incident. One male and his 10-year old daughter had managed to get out of the property, but it with regret that it was confirmed that his wife and their 4-year old daughter tragically died as a result of the fire.

At this time it is believed that the property was fitted with one smoke detector but the battery had been removed.

It can happen anywhere, luckily the smoke alarm was working in a house in Abbey Road (as we were going to print), where a pan was left on the stove unattended the sound of the alarm alerted the next door neighbour who smelt burning and looked through the letter box to see the smoke, a 999 call brought the Fire Brigade in time to stop what could have been a big fire

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## Popley Pond Local Nature Reserve It's Official

### Popley Conservation Volunteers

Popley Ponds, one of Popley's best kept secrets, will not be threatened with development but has won important status as a new Nature Reserve.

During a very wet Popley Festival there were lots of visitors to the Popley Conservation Volunteers display. This showed there is plenty of interest in green spaces and conservation around Popley.

What is amazing is that so many people still do not know where Popley Ponds are located. Interestingly most of the young people did not know either, but if we mentioned the White Horse most seemed to know immediately. Perhaps more about this in the future.

Those who did know where the ponds were, expressed concern about the future protection of the ponds. Some people were concerned that with all the development taking place in the area, the future of the ponds might be under threat.

For some time now the area around the ponds has been designated as a Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC). Local councils give this as recognition that an area is important for conservation. Unfortunately this has very little meaning in law and does not give a great deal of protection.

Some time ago I was told that the officers of the council were in talks with English Nature about re-designating the site. Time went by and I had almost forgotten about this when out of the blue I received a wonderful piece of news. Popley Ponds has been given Local Nature Reserve status. This puts the area on a much higher standing both in conservation terms and in law and affords much greater protection than before.

To achieve this, the council have to be able to satisfy English Nature that they are committed to overseeing management of the site sensitively, for conservation, public enjoyment and access for the benefit of local people. It also shows there is an ongoing commitment towards such sites for the benefit of both people and wildlife. It does not mean that the council will undertake to do all the work and maintain the site but will work in partnership with local people to maintain and secure the future of the site.

So although I think we can now say the site is secure for the foreseeable future it is up to Popley people to take on board the well being and maintenance of this special area.

If we are to continue to improve the site, Popley Conservation Volunteers will need a lot more help. So all of you who said at Popley Festival you would be interested in helping, now is the time to step forward. The Community Wardens have launched their Proud of Popley initiative. By becoming involved in conservation, this is one way you could help to make Popley a green place to be proud of.

# Longfellow Parade Regeneration Update

Further to our article in the April issue of Popley Matters, Sentinel's Board has now approved the commencement of the Longfellow Regeneration Project. The allocation of Housing Grant has still only a reserve status; however the funding is more likely to be secured once building works commence.

Our partnership contractor, Mansells, has been selected form our framework panel of builders to work up detailed planning proposals over the next four months. Mansells will be well known to many residents in Popley as they have recently been working successfully on the Oakridge regeneration project.

Following the initial production of draft proposals, local residents and stakeholders will be widely consulted over the designs and we plan to hold a number of open days prior to any formal planning application being made.

As the project will be complex to build we anticipate that works will be carried out in three distinct phases starting at Marlow Close early next year and ending at Dryden Close up to four years after this date.

This phasing will allow adequate time for us to relocate the shops to Shakespeare Road plus purchase back the last handful of flats in the Longfellow Parade.

The project is now entering a new stage where a lot of activity will begin. As the new project team is pulled together, residents will be informed of all new developments and progress in greater detail through the Longfellow Parade Newsletter.

## PENSIONERS URGED: DON'T MISS OUT ON PENSION CREDIT

Pensioners in Basingstoke could be missing out on extra money each week from Pension Credit, according to research by the PENSION SERVICE. Many just don't think they will be eligible, or don't realise how easy it is to find out about their potential entitlement.

Amounts of money can be substantial, with average awards of Pension Credit of around £40 per week and the possibility of awards being backdated for 12 months.

The Pension Service is writing to those they believe may be missing out, but there is no reason to wait to find out if you, an elderly relative or friend are entitled to extra money each week. Simply call Free phone 0800 99 1234 and staff will answer any questions you have about entitlement, as well as completing the application form for you over the 'phone. If you or your partner are responsible for rent or Council Tax, the Pension Service can also help you to apply for Housing Benefit and Council Tax Benefit at the same time.

Pension Reform Minister, Stephen Timms said "All it takes is a call to the PENSION CREDIT APPLICATION LINE on 0800 99 1234 to help ensure that you get all of the money you are entitled to, including help applying for benefits such as Pension Credit or Council Tax Benefit. If you are entitled, then it is money that is rightfully yours and we're here to help you get it."

Pensioners who prefer to discuss the claim in their own home can request a visit from the local service.
