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

Dear Editor; I read the Old Codgers article and, as a water scientist, I thought I would shed light on the issue of the right kind of rain.

During the summer, the ground becomes very hard and you'll notice when watering the garden, the water just runs over the top and doesn't sink in very quickly. Also, when it rains in the summer, it is generally hard and is in short bursts annoying because it soaks the washing on the line before you even notice it has rained. This generally runs very quickly into the rivers rather than soaking into the ground replenishing the groundwater. This is why we get flash floods, there is no where to store the water, particularly in the long run. In the winter, the rain is generally more drizzly and sustained. this softens the ground up and lets the water pass through

to the water table. the problem is that we have had very little rain over the winter which is why we have drought problems. We should use the new development as an opportunity to harvest the water that falls on the roofs and the car parks etc. This could be collected and recycled, either down the loo or as a community irrigation system or some other similar scheme.

Energy is another thing to be considered in these new developments, in all this heat and sun, is anyone considering the possibility of harvesting this energy? That is another story altogether! Orkney Close.

## Diaries from the Old Codger

I was asked by a lady a few weeks ago How come you can remember so much of your childhood? I told her that I can remember because I had so much fun and laughter in our house, hardly ever a cross word, or if there were it was soon forgotten. Yes, I remember horrid things but they tend to be pushed aside, because of the support you had from your family and friends. Its not about the amount of money we had, in fact with five kids Mum and Dad had a hard time of it, not like it is today! Back in the 1800-1900s families were even bigger, as with the third world countries today. The mortality rate was high in children so you had lots of them, and of course no contraception. A lot of children were never christened until they were between two and five just in case they did not get past the first years. Then we had the first and second World Wars, and the message went out from the government for married people to have more children as so many people lost their lives in these two wars. Then that all changed to having two point two children. No wonder people get confused "Her-Indoors" said we ended up with three as she could not see a way to get the point two of a child, can you? Metric is hard to get your head round as it is, with out this point stuff. Millimetres, Kilometres etc. Give me feet and inches, pounds and pence any time.

During the war years our women stayed at home, well most did, many working in factories like Thornycrofts building the trucks, tanks, planes, ammunition, etc in order that the men could fight the wars, I know my wife's Gran worked in the ammunition factory during the day and at night would be on the anti air craft guns. My Mother was teaching new recruits how to shoot their guns. Now the thing that gets me is, where in Basingstoke are these women recognized for this work, I have been given to understand that the clock from Thornycroft is to be put in the roundabout by Milestones Why not also recognize the work these great women did? It would be a great opportunity to do so.

I have found a couple of great things over the last few weeks one is a book that is end to end of photos during and after the war



## DANGEROUS FURNITURE WARNING



Say 'No' to salesmen selling cheap furniture at your door and stay safe. That's the message from Hampshire County Council's Trading Standards Service, following an investigation into door-to-door sales of budget 3-piece suites that don't meet UK fire safety legislation.

The warning comes after Hampshire Trading Standards discovered illegal furniture from Poland at a warehouse in South Wonston, Winchester. In total 35 pieces of furniture were seized. Samples were taken and tested against flammability standards. The furniture, marked with labels claiming it complies with safety regulations, was unsafe - burning rapidly, producing toxic smoke and a fireball in under three minutes.

Trading Standards have learned that after the furniture was dropped off at the Hampshire warehouse, it was separated into smaller quantities that were picked up by men in Transit vans to be sold to local people door-to-door.

Doorstep sales of illegal furniture is a nationwide problem that the police are aware of and investigations are being carried out. Trading Standards are hoping to put a stop to this illegal practice by discouraging people from buying such goods at the door.

Rod Hammerton, Community Safety Manager at Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service, commenting on the unsafe furniture: "It is essential that people always consider the fire safety of any furniture they purchase to protect their homes and families. It is appalling that unsafe furniture is sold with labels implying it complies with fire safety regulations - this is puts lives at risk. Any residents that are concerned about the fire safety of their furniture can contact Hampshire Trading Standards."

Leader of Hampshire County Council, Councillor Ken Thornber, said: "It is shocking that unsafe furniture is being sold to people at their doors. It is even more worrying that these goods are labelled as safe, when they are far from it. These pieces of furniture may be cheap, but they are not a good deal if they put lives at risk. "It is often the most vulnerable people in the community who are targeted by these unscrupulous sales people who try and push their products onto those who find it difficult to say 'no'."

Anyone who has concerns about someone selling goods or offering services at their doorstep can contact Trading Standards' Quick Response Team (QRT), which aims to catch rogue traders in action. Since its launch in June 2004 the QRT has saved residents tens of thousands of pounds that could have gone into the pockets of conmen and criminals.

Residents seeking peace of mind can also use the Buy With Confidence Scheme, which is a list of local businesses offering goods and services that have been assessed for trustworthiness and compliance with the law by Trading Standards. To arrange a free Home Fire Safety Visit, where Firefighters will help people to identify and reduce fire risks in their home, highlight the importance of having an escape plan should a fire happen, and if necessary fit smoke alarms, the number to call is 023 8062 6809.

Popley has grown up from mostly with the roots in London and your forbears may have come there. ## Arial Acrobatics & An Anniversary Popley Conservation Volunteers

A number of airborne displays take place in Basingstoke every year. Balloons over Basingstoke and a kite festival being just two. However, for me, one of the most exciting aerial displays I have seen took place over Popley a little while ago. It could have been easily missed and for some it may not have seemed all that spectacular.

It was during the occasion of the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of Popley Fields Community Centre when the conservation volunteers spotted a Kite. Not one attached to a piece of string but a raptor, a Red Kite circling over Popley.

In medieval times the Kite was common all over the country, even in towns. The Kite is basically a scavenger. Then a combination of clean up and better handling of refuse in the towns and persecution from gamekeepers and landowners in the countryside saw the rapid decline of this bird. By the end of the nineteenth century it was confined to a few remote parts of Wales.

I remember 35 years ago backpacking through Wales in the vastness of a mountainous area known as the Welsh Wilderness when I saw a large bird being mobbed by smaller birds. I did not have a clue what it was and when I got back I identified it as a Red Kite. At that time, Wales was still the only place Kites could be found. I was very thrilled to have had the privilege of seeing one of these rare birds. I think at the time many thought that the Kite was on its way to extinction in the UK. Just 15 years ago if you wanted to see a Kite you would still have needed to travel to Wales.

Since then a Red Kite reintroduction programme has taken place in various parts of the UK. In some areas this has been very successful especially in the south where the Red Kite population is flourishing and expanding. So with a bit of luck we may see more Red Kites over Popley. I hope if you see one you will enjoy watching this beautiful and graceful bird as much as I do.

Reintroduction of this striking bird has been one of the great conservation successes in recent years. It should be an inspiration to all who are interested in conservation. It is easy to get gloomy about protection of wildlife with so many losses of species and habitat. So it was good to celebrate the return of the Red Kite at the Popley Fields Community Centre celebration. Somehow it seemed fitting. Lets hope that the Community Centre and our Kites will flourish and go from strength to strength.

Reintroduction of the Red Kite has needed a great deal of practical input from conservationists. Good wishes and kind thoughts alone could not have achieved the success. The same applies to Popley. I am pleased to say that there are many people in Popley who are well wishers, but if you do care about a greener Popley what we need is your help.
