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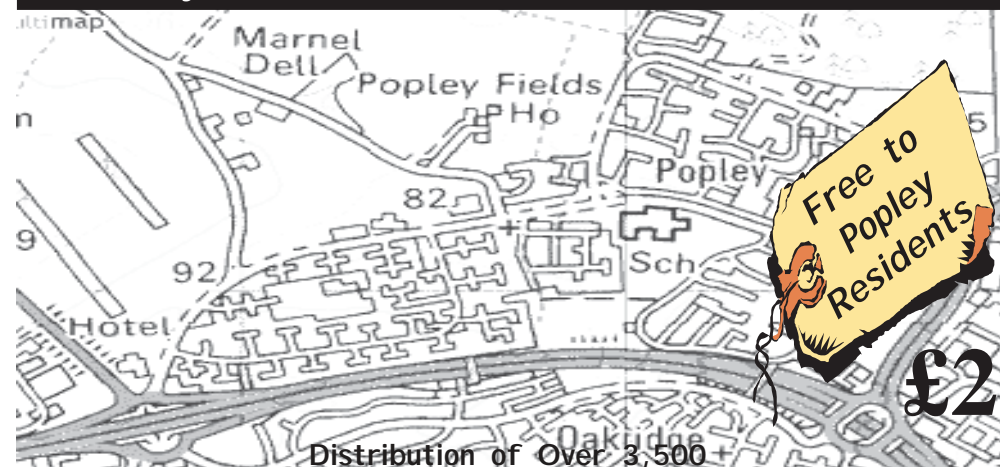

I take pride in where I live, let's encourage the people around us to do the same. That way the distrust can disappear and a bit of harmony can be restored. From a very angry resident.

Editors reply; I too am very proud of Popley and am saddened that you have been a victim of crime. The Police Councillors and Wardens have been trying to set up Neighbourhood Watch schemes but we can't seem to get enough people interested. I have lived in Popley for nearly 36 years and the crime now is no worse and in fact less than in most other places, so I do not think we deserve to be stereotyped as you suggest. How Deep Is The White Horse?

That all depends when you visit. Over the last two years it has rarely been more than about 3ft deep and has completely dried up during the summers of 05 and 06. Rumour has it that it gets a lot deeper than this, but unless you have been coming along to the White Horse (Popley Pond) for more than a couple of years you have never seen this.

This autumn the heavy rains have filled the pond. In fact it has almost reached its maximum depth and is holding more water than it has for 3 or 4 years. Water is running from the western pond down through the Willow Carr into the main pond. The eastern pond is showing a good depth of water. The Willows we were cutting about this time last year are now under a couple of feet of water.

The Leisure Services department of B&DBC have organised three corporate tasks at the White Horse this

autumn, and great efforts have been made to tidy up brash that had been produced from these tasks. And just in time. Brash piles, which had been left in the lower areas, have only just been removed in the nick of time before the waters rose. Enormous thanks are due to those who turned out on 25 November during a thunder storm and valiantly worked to remove brash to higher ground. If this had not been done I think a fair bit of it would now be floating in the pond.

On 12 November the team were digging reeds from the bed of a dry pond. On the basis of conditions over the last few years we scheduled some more reed clearing for the 12 December. At the time of writing (5 December) the area is now under 6-9ft of water.

This all goes to show that management of the White Horse is far from simple. Not only do we have the complexities of working around the Great Crested Newts we are very much under the influence of the weather. However, even if it is difficult to plan, it all makes for an interesting challenge.

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Don't Throw Away Your Tree - Recycle It

As Christmas comes to an end and Twelfth Night approaches, it comes time to take down your real fir trees. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is reminding people to recycle them when all the celebrations are over instead of adding to the mountains of rubbish thrown away over the festive season.

The council has set up 20 collection points across the borough to make it easy for residents to recycle their trees. Residents can simply leave their trees for collection at one of the allocated sites and it will be collected by the council's Street Care team and taken to be recycled to create Pro-Grow, a high quality soil conditioner.

Last year in Basingstoke and Deane residents recycled over 4,000 trees through the council's collection points and stopped 37 tonnes of waste being created. By recycling their Christmas tree, residents can make a real difference to the amount of waste we throw away in Basingstoke and Deane. Each year in the UK, 5 million real Christmas trees are thrown away this creates about 9,000 tonnes of additional waste.

You can recycle your Christmas paper (except for the metallic type). Big cardboard boxes can be folded down and left by your bins to be collected. As well as your Christmas cards cardboard food boxes, like your mince pies were in, can be put in your green bins. Some charities collect old cards or, like me, you can make your gift tags out of them for next year,

We all create so much more rubbish over the festive season and it's important to remember to keep recycling everything we can. Getting rid of the Christmas tree when all the fun and festivities are over can be a real nuisance.

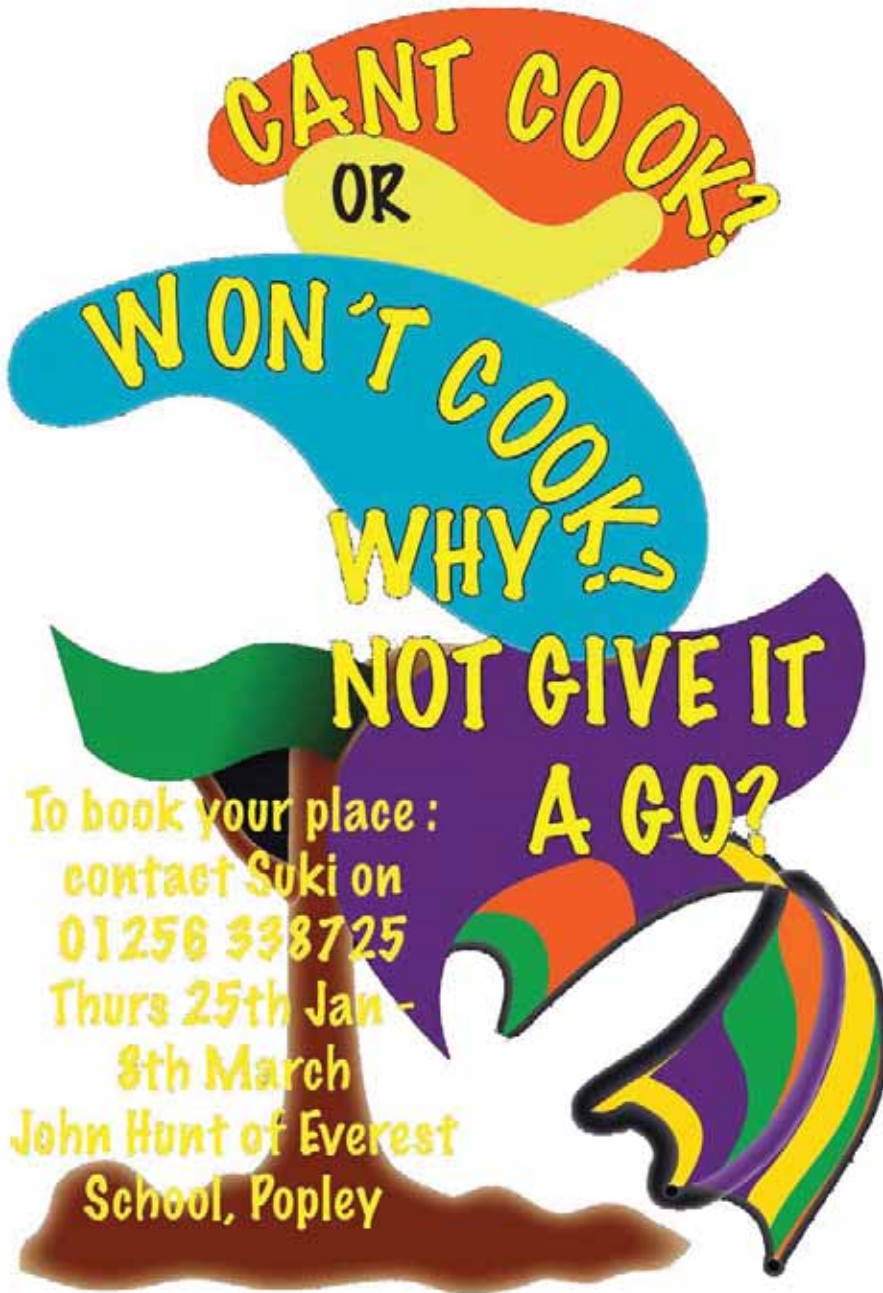
This service makes it simple for residents to take their tree to a nearby collection point and help them do their bit for the environment.

The collections will run from Wednesday January 3rd 2007 to Wednesday January 17th 2007. The following collection points nearest to Popley are:

Basingstoke Town Centre, Memorial Park (Crossborough Hill car park); and Homebase, Winchester Road

If you miss the collections at these locations, you can take your tree to the Recycling Centre on Wade Road.

The opening hours at Wade Road are 8am to 4pm - closed Jan 1st 2007. Open all other days. *Jane Frankum*



Councillors Page: I went to Bishops Green to see a demonstration on household sprinklers. The Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service used (by kind permission of Sentinel) a pair of semidetached houses that were due for demolition to show the advantage of sprinklers. Cameras were installed in each of the houses to show how quickly a fire spreads. A sofa was set alight in each front room at the same time. I watched how quickly fire and smoke blotted out the cameras. The house without sprinklers was left for about five minutes or so, as that is about how long a fire engine would take on average to attend the fire. I watched as the smoke poured out of the windows and roof. Within less than two minutes the fire was put out in the house with sprinklers. When safe, I was able to go into both houses to see the damage inside the difference was amazing. In house without the sprinkles, the ceiling was burnt through, there was burnt furniture and thick black soot everywhere. And worst of all was that if a person had been in there they would most likely not survive. In the other with the sprinkler, there was some damage to the corner of the sofa but everything else survived (including the camera that carried on filming), as would the people who could have been in there. What has this to do with Popley? Well, I would like to see sprinklers in all new affordable housing like Maldive and Faroe when the regeneration starts.

Popley West: You may have noticed that the bus shelter opposite Tintern Close has been demolished. This is due to the shelter not being strong enough to withstand the winds in this exposed space. It will be replaced by a much more robust one.

I welcome the new legislation that the Government are proposing, to taking away the power that bus companies have with regard routing buses where they like, at a price chosen by them, and when they like. It is proposed that it will go back to local councils who will be able to get a bus service that at last suits the residents much better.

The "Blue Bag" collection reared up again in Basingstoke just days before Christmas. They try to make it look like it is a charity and it most certainly is not! This is a registered business with an address in London (the address is "shared" by 35 other businesses).

100 not out ?? - not the cricket scout but a record of Scouting's achievement... !!

The fledgling movement began in 1907 when Lord Robert Baden Powell took twenty young lads camping on Brownsea Island. Today Scouting has grown beyond imagination and is now the largest youth movement in the world with over 400,000 members in the UK .

There are three Scout District within the Borough of Basingstoke and Deane; Basingstoke East, Basingstoke West and Silchester. Most areas of Basingstoke, the town centre and surrounding urban areas and villages have a Scout Group. Groups meet in wooden huts and school halls. Some are fortunate to have their own Headquarters.

There are two Scout Groups in Popley. Basingstoke Air Scouts have their own Headquarters at Base 2000 in Carpenters Down. 1st Popley (Everest) Scout Group meets in St. Gabriel's Church Hall in Tewskesbury Close. Both offer a Beaver section for boys and girls aged from 6-8 years; a cub section for 8-10½ years and a Scout Troop for those 10½ - 14 years. Provision for the over 14's is offered as Explorer Scouts. Basingstoke East District has two Explorer Scout units based as Chineham and at Glebe Hall (behind St. Michael's Church Cottage) in the town centre.

Basingstoke has exciting plans to celebrate this unique year in Scouting's history. In April all three Districts will join together for the St. George's Day Parade followed by a service in Basingstoke War Memorial Park . A Festival of Flags is to be held in Winchester Cathedral in July and later that month 3-D 2007 promises high jumps, climbing wall, pioneering, birds of prey, farm animals, and all manner of activities for members to enjoy. Centenary Camps will be held in August in the New Forest.

Did you know?

- ❖ Every day two people die in a fire, Make sure it isn't you.
- ❖ You can survive a fire if you plan what to do before it happens.

What to do:

- ❖ Have a night-time routine including closing inside doors when you go to bed.
- ❖ One of the most important things you can do is to plan your escape route.
- ❖ Get everyone together and leave the building, taking extra care of children or elderly.
- ❖ Think about what to do if you can't leave by this route:
- ❖ Have an "escape room" in mind, the room that's best to survive in.
- ❖ Put bedding by the door to prevent smoke coming into the room.
- ❖ I deally at the front of the house so the firefighters can see you as they arrive.
- ❖ Remember to keep door and window keys where you can find them.
- ❖ If friends or family come to stay at your home, make them aware of the fire escape plan.

YOUR LOCAL SCHOOL NEEDS YOU!

"I first became a Governor because I was trying to give something back, and I wanted to know what was going on with my children's education, and after a few years I realised I could make a difference."

Ron Wilkes has been a governor at Westfields Junior School in Yateley for the last eleven years, and his contribution to school life has not gone unnoticed. He was recently announced the Department of Education's Governor of the year in South England.

Governors are a vital part of any school in Hampshire, making crucial decisions that affect the children who do and will attend the school. But there is a shortage of people coming forward for the role in some areas of Hampshire, despite the rewards it can offer.

"It really does give you satisfaction, I find it far more rewarding working with children than with adults. You can bring in a different outlook to the school teachers are educational, if you're a governor you're looking at issues from a different perspective.

"I'm not academic, but I would say that you need an open mind and common sense. You need to be receptive to needs of other people and have a common sense attitude in dealing with it. The role gives you a sense of satisfaction. I like to think that if you've made a difference to one child's life then its worthwhile."

Hampshire has more than 500 schools and around 8,000 governors who play a crucial role, representing the interests of the general public in the way a school is run and the educational standards that pupils achieve.

Governors are volunteers who need to be good at reading, thinking, listening, and talking with other adults to agree what's best for the school they serve. They don't need any special expertise as free training is available.

On average governors spend about 20 hours a term, (mainly in the evenings) going to meetings, attending training and visiting their school. They are usually appointed for four years although some can't stay that long and others continue to volunteer for many more years. There are around 1500 vacancies in the county of Hampshire many of them are in Basingstoke and the surrounding areas.

A Hampshire County Council representative said "It is a great pleasure to see a Hampshire governor recognised in this way. Governors do a very vital job and we are always keen to encourage more people from our communities across the county to become Governors at their local schools. Ofsted reports continue to show that Hampshire's schools are among the best in the country and it is thanks not only to the commitment and hard work of our teaching staff but also thanks to the unique contribution people like Ron Wilkes make."

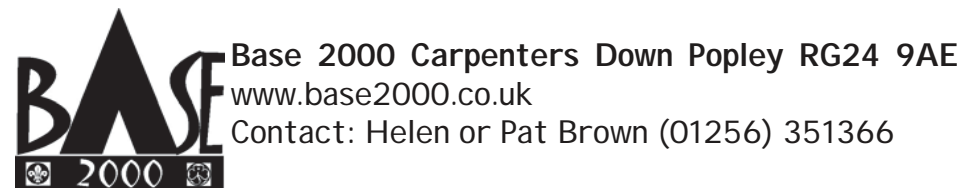

AMAZING GRACE, HOW SWEET THE SOUND!

John Newton was a slave trader captain of a ship that carried a sad cargo of Africans torn from family, homeland and friends. He thought nothing of his cargo except as items for trade. Any sick people he regarded as “damaged goods” and threw them overboard. He was a “nominal Christian” but lived a life himself “enslaved” to drink and other addictions.

One day, a severe storm engulfed his ship and he realised, with horror, that he might soon meet his creator. He cried out to God and he was saved from immediate death and ultimately hell. He realised how sad his life was and became a “born again” Christian. Because of God’s love and mercy, he wrote this famous hymn (which later, even reached No.1 in the pop charts!).

John Newton joined forces with another fervent Christian, William Wilberforce and together with others, persuaded Parliament to outlaw the slave trade.

Our Prime Minister recently made an announcement regretting this country’s involvement in slavery because 2007 will be the 200th anniversary since its abolition in 1807.

Grace is a somewhat old fashioned word but it means the undeserved favour of God in our lives. It is God’s love and mercy freely given because Jesus took our blame for all the wrong we have ever done. However we have to receive it from God if we are to receive Jesus as our friend and saviour, God as our Father, and the Holy Spirit as our comforter! ***Like John Newton You can have a brand new start in 2007!*** Make Jesus your New Year Resolution!

Diaries from the Old Codger



Years ago when Christmas was just that, Christmas. We never got a lot but loved every bit of it, going to bed and trying to listen out for Father Christmas to come. Of course we never did hear him, we would be fast asleep when he came. I don't know how he managed it on all the drink and mince pies left out for him. And as for the reindeer they could not get off the ground with all the carrots that we, as children, had left for them. Then we would wake up at some ungodly hour, creep downstairs and see all the sacks in a line in the front room. With my brothers and my three sisters, we tried to be quiet but could not hold back if we got the present we wanted. They were never like the things kids get today, but they meant every thing to us. What we children did not appreciate was the amount of hard work Mum and Dad put in at the jobs they did, in order to buy as much as they could. My Mum had three jobs cleaning back then. One was at a church, the other at a dentist and also at a lady's house. Dad laid floors that took him away. The company paid for B&B but he and my uncle would sleep on the boxes of floor tiles so they had that bit extra cash. Then there was Christmas dinner with all the trimmings.

Then off to one of the family houses for a party on Boxing Day. All the drink and food went to the next family for yet another party, and this is how it went on. I can remember one year at my Gran's in East Ham we had a party from Christmas Eve that lasted till the New Years Day. My Grandfather had a hand cart and all the drink and food was loaded on to it each day and then carted off to the next family house. We walked miles, well as a small boy it felt like it. Going from one end of the Barking Road to the other, then to my aunts at Stratford it was on to Canning Town. I have said before, Granddad was a cooper. Boy did he get some strong drink out of the barrels that came back in the ships. They had to steam them out and the spirit was all in the oak casks. It would come out dark brown and the taste was wonderful. We had some in big jugs right up to the late 60's. So it went on, long after the war years. Today we try and keep as much of our Christmas alive in that all the kids come over to me. When they were young I always got a Christmas Eve

present for them, nothing big just a treat. Now my daughter has three children, I give them a present and not Mum and Dad. All the rest of the family have no children so they get presents still. Then it's our Christmas Day. The tree has all the main presents under it, in the kitchen the wines are open, food cooking, and a few beers before we eat in the afternoon. We all sit down and then the fun begins ripping open the paper on the presents. A few brandies after, then a kip, ready to start all over again in the evening. It's such a hard life for me!

"Her Indoors" has all the work to do. I do feel for her. Every now and then I call out to the kitchen "Are you alright Sweetness?" (see I can creep). Not a word comes back. That means "Get off your b— and give me a hand". So with a sigh I go out and take control of things. (Well I wash a few pots for her. This always works. I can then get back to my pint. We all have too much to eat and too much to drink as we indulge ourselves. But it only comes round once a year.

I do like to see "Her Indoors" feel useful now and then. It just sets the next year off just right. Wait a minute, it's me that cooks all week and cleans. "Her Indoors" only has to go out and earn the money to keep me in the way I am accustomed to, bless her. I do miss her when she is at work. Not that it is because of the work in the house. I could get her to take the dog for long walks, that way I can rest. OK I know when "Her Indoors" reads this she is going to give me what for, but I can live in a world of my own now and then and dream. Still the Old Codger is one of these people that has a big heart and I would be happy if we only had the basic foods in our house.

When I think of the way our world has become over the years, so much sadness, so many wars, and for what? Noone has ever won in war and no one ever will. It is time now for countries to sit and talk, to sit in the same rooms as each other as they are all flesh and blood the same as you and me. They all have their own interpretations of God. If they can just take that first step and by doing that make 2007 a year of peace and give our younger generations a future.
