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

Editor's Reply; Thank you. The current team has been together now producing the magazine for over 10 years. I will pass on your good wishes to all the team.

Dear Editor; In reply to Soapbox who seems confused why the estates on Popley have numbers, I believe I can help. Shakespeare Road was the first estate to be started, Maldive and surrounding area was next, and then came Falkland Road and the rest of that estate. Next was Abbey Road area followed by Trinidad and Tobago, and finally Pershore Road area.

As all this was being put up as soon as possible as the housing was needed quickly. There was more than one estate being built at the same time. Of course there was a lot of contractor lorries, tradesmen etc going to these building sites and as a lot of the roads had not yet been named it was easier to just call them Popley 1 2 3 4 5 or 6, so everyone knew where to deliver to or where they had to go to work. Later they were designated as 1 Popley Poets, 2 3 5 and 6 Popley Islands and Popley 4 as Popley Abbeys. I do not know if these addresses are still valid or are we just Popley East and Popley West now. The estates are still called by numbers by those of us who lived and worked on these estates just out of sheer habit, which is a shame because if we were made to have an address with a number in it we would create about it. The fact is of our own fault that we

are known as numbers. If I should be proven wrong in any way as regard detail I do not mind being corrected.

What do you think write and let us know.

Dear Editor; I am not really writing this in order for it to be printed, but in the hope of opening a discussion.

I'm currently involved in some MA research that has made me very aware of the challenge we face as fossil fuels become increasingly limited and expensive. This could have a massive impact on food availability since so much is imported and travels huge distances. I feel concerned that so much local farmland is being lost which might one day be an essential resource for Popley. I'm wondering if there are small steps that could be taken to help us become aware of the need for local food and less dependence on oil. For example, the council could plant more fruit and nut trees in parks and school fields; there could be greater emphasis placed on land for allotments and more 'show' allotments in parks to encourage and teach interested people; there could be a community compost scheme at the dump making compost more cheaply available for those growing vegetables; local schools might have vegetable gardens and fruit trees. I understand that there is sometimes pressure to sell allotment land to housing developers. I think this would be disastrous.

This is the highest award that can be given to a Beaver Scout and requires full commitment to the programme of activities and achievement in several specific areas such as outdoor pursuits, exploring, friendship and creativity. Four members of the cub section moved on to the Troop recently. We wish them good luck. They are already looking forward their first camp as scouts at H007.

Excitement mounts as Basingstoke's Centenary of Scouting '3-D 2007' Activity Day in July approaches. Over forty different activities will be on offer ranging from high ropes, climbing walls and a laser dome to crafts, pony rides, air rifle shooting, archery, an animal petting zoo and arena displays with birds of prey and vultures, the New Forest Scout Band and a one-man-band. The day will end with a traditional campfire. '3-D 2007' is a day of celebration and fun for all Scouts, Cubs, and Beavers in Basingstoke and is restricted to members only.

At the end of July twenty five Air Scouts, Cubs and Leaders will join four thousand others for Hampshire Scouting's H007 Centenary Camp on the New Forest Showground. As well as on site activities like go karting, high ropes and assault courses the programme will include off-site visits to Thorpe Park, Longleat and RAF Hendon together with dragon boating and water activities. One of the highlights of the week will be Sunrise Day on 1st August when campers will be joined by the Beaver section. 1st August is the precise day upon which Lord Robert Baden Powell, the Founder of Scouting, first blew a kudu horn to signify the start of his experimental Scout camp on Brownsea Island in 1907 for twenty young lads. The Scout Association in the UK alone now numbers just under half a million!

The Group Annual Meeting will be held on Tuesday 12th June. All parents of members are expected to attend. Parking, noise and other factors are the issue.

Popley Conservation Volunteers

It is always a pleasure to welcome and show people around who are interested in conservation and green space around Popley.

A couple of months ago our MP Maria Miller came to work with us and look around.

In April, Hampshire Wild life Trust paid a visit. A great deal of interest was shown in the Popley Ponds and the mitigation area. With the help of ecologist Matt Smith it was possible show them all three species of newt that inhabit the ponds.

The long dry spell during April saw the waters in Popley Ponds drop more rapidly than normal. It soon became clear that parts of the pond would soon dry up completely. We knew that one area in particular would have frog and newt tadpoles so for the second year running it was decided to mount a rescue and transfer as many tadpoles as possible to the main pond. On our visit our local Community Wardens, Sarah and David dropped in to see how we were progressing. The photos show David and Sarah looking inquisitively at some bugs that had also been caught and enjoying a joke with us. It was good to be able to welcome them and know they are keeping an eye on things.



Later we were joined by a couple of youngsters. Popley Ponds is a great place for youngsters and they are often very inquisitive and full of questions. It is great to see young people take interest in nature and it is a delight to answer their questions.

As Popley Conservation Volunteers are becoming better known we are increasingly receiving request for help with conservation work. It is flattering to be in such demand but we are now reaching the stage where it might not be possible to meet all the requests. So in the future we may have to turn down some calls for help.

Some of the plans for this summer include a bat evening, and a moth trapping evening. It looks as though we may be involved in creating a new pond at Marnel school.

Making Hampshire Safer



BBO Safety.

The season of sunshine, laughter and good times is nearly upon us. Barbeques, parties and beers, here are some tips to ensure your BBQ, doesn't end in tears!!

- ✓ Make sure that your barbecue is in good working order.
- ✓ Set up your barbecue on level ground away from fences, bushes, tents or buildings.
- ✓ Only put about 5 cm of charcoal in the barbecue and store the rest away from the fire.
- ✓ Make sure the coals are cool before you try to move the barbecue. Once cool, dispose of the ashes safely - never place them in dustbins.

Gas Barbecues:

- ✓ Make sure the tap is turned off before changing the gas cylinder.
- ✓ Change gas cylinders in the open air if possible to ensure good ventilation.
- ✓ If you have a protective cover for your BBQ ensure that the unit is completely cool before covering and storing away.
- ✓ If you find a leaky joint, try to tighten it but be careful not to over-tighten it.

NEVER: Use petrol or paraffin to start or revive your barbecue, only use recognized lighters or starter fluid, on *COLD* coals.

Top Tips:

- *Keep young children, animals and ball games away from the cooking area.*
- *Only use recommended fluids or fire lighters and never petrol.*
- *If you suspect a leak to the gas cylinder or pipe work, brush soapy water around all joints and watch for bubbles.*
- *When you've finished cooking, turn off the gas cylinders before you turn off the barbecue controls, to ensure any gas in the pipeline is used up.*
- *Keep a bucket of water, sand or a garden hose nearby in case of emergencies.*

REMEMBER: *ENJOY YOURSELF, but too much alcohol and fire don't mix!!*



School Governors

Have you ever considered being a school governor? I have been a school governor for nearly 15 years and find it really enjoyable and rewarding.

The School Governing Body system is designed to ensure that all interested parties have the opportunity to have their say in the management of the school. School governors are chosen to represent the parents, staff, local authority and local community. However, the system does rely on people to volunteer to play their part. School governors are unpaid volunteers and a fairly serious commitment is required. Because being a school governor is a fairly serious commitment, there is always a shortage of volunteers.

Each year, governors are usually expected to attend approximately 6 full governing body meetings held in the evenings and 6 committee meetings that may be either in the day or the evening (times are agreed by committee members). This averages at about one meeting per month and there is paperwork to be read in advance of each meeting. New governors are offered training and support – usually either 1 whole day or 3 evenings and a visit to the school.



If you feel a bit apprehensive because you don't know what a school governor does, don't worry, everyone was new once and there is plenty of support and training. You do not need to have any particular qualifications or experience to be a school governor. However, all governors must agree to a criminal record check to be sure that they are not a danger to children. Governors must be able to read the paperwork provided and be able to contribute to meetings.

The most important requirement is a commitment to ensuring that all children have the best possible educational opportunities.

So why become a school governor? There are other opportunities for people with skills in sports, drama, cookery, art etc to volunteer to run activities for children. School governors are part of the school management team. This can provide an excellent opportunity to use management and organisational skills, and experience that you may have gained at work or through a group, a club, a church or similar organisation to benefit local children. Playing a part in the education of our children is very rewarding. Parent governors are elected from parents of pupils at each school. Parents who are interested in being a governor at their child's school should contact the school directly to learn whether there are any vacancies. Community governors represent the local community and are appointed by other governors on the governing body. If you are interested in being a community governor of a local school, approach the school directly. Local authority governors are appointed by our local councillor, Jane Frankum. If you are interested in being a local authority governor, Jane would love to hear from you. Jean (School Governor)

Dear Friends

I took a month off writing last month because of the pressures of Easter, but what a fab time it was. This month it was suggested by the editor that I write something about St. Gabriel's as we don't often blow our own trumpet – so here goes!

When I arrived three years ago, St Gabriel's had a very small but very faithful congregation and for the most part the church had slipped below the horizon of most of the residents of Popley. It seemed that many didn't even know we were here. When I was growing up in Manchester, the two focal points of the community were the pub and the church, and I guess that was so for most communities. Allegedly, Norwich has 365 pubs (one for each day of the year) and 52 churches (one for each Sunday)! So we were determined at St Gabriel's to become a focal point for the community.

Three years later we're well on our way to achieving that goal. On Monday mornings Babysong meet in the hall. This is a group for young mums with infants and toddlers who gather to learn and sing nursery rhymes with all the actions. The object is to aid and improve the development of speech and motor skills for the young ones, as well as providing a great social time for the mums. On Monday evenings the Boys Brigade meet in the hall – a great way for boys from age 5 upwards to meet and share in games and activities in ways that provide learning and fun.

Tuesday mornings the Well Baby Clinic run by Hampshire PCT meets in the hall, and every other Tuesday our craft group use the church while enjoying tea and cakes. Tuesday evenings from 5.30 the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts use the hall. Wednesday afternoon and Saturday morning Kumon Maths and English group use the hall to provide extra coaching for children in these important subjects, while in the evenings one of our Bible study groups meet in the foyer from 7.30 onwards.

From July 12th Thursday afternoons will see the Golden Club meeting in the hall. This is a group for senior citizens who meet for a game of bingo and a cup of tea – a very social place to be! On Fridays the Mums and Toddlers group Funky Munkys meet in the hall from 10.00 am till 2pm.

St Gabriel's is a busy place these days and all our groups are open to you, the community.

So what happens on Sunday???

Our services have grown along with everything else at the church. We meet at 10.30 for Family Services which are lively and informal while retaining the best elements of traditional church worship. On any typical Sunday our congregation represents all ages from eight months to the over eighties. It's a great family atmosphere where all are welcomed irrespective of background – and that's as it should be.

If you haven't been to St Gabriel's before, or haven't been back for a while, why not pay us a visit and see just how good God really is!!

As I have said I loved my job and the people that all worked so hard to make people better and get back on their feet. I have known people complain about Basingstoke Hospital but the work the staff do does not justify that. I owe my life to them and I know many people of Popley do as well. Every morning we are up by about 5.30 in the morning and by 6.45 she is off to work making sure that I have everything and I am safe. She has to work because we could not pay our mortgage otherwise. I do contribute but if she were to stop work then I do not know what we would do. Her Indoors drives the 59 miles to work each day down the motorway to Bournemouth and back again in the evenings at about 4.30. I try and do as much as I can in the day, and as she has sorted dinner out I only have to put it on. When she gets in she finishes it off. She has a very stressful job and to have me to look after aswell puts a great strain on her. We never expected our lives to turn out like this. We expected just to grow old together and enjoy retirement and have a bit of fun along the way. We still do but it is limited. If any one said to me you can have whatever you want just make a wish. I would just wish for Her Indoors.

I have over the years met some wonderful people in Basingstoke and across the country on my travels. I have stood by our town because of what they gave my children and us. Would I go to another place? No, we have lived here over half our lives. Basingstoke gave our children the start in life that has put them on a road to enjoy the same life Basingstoke gave us. So on my travels I always say "Come and see us it's a great town. Everywhere has its problems but we are no worse than the next town, but above all the people in it will always make you welcome. None more so than the community on the Popley estates. They are like family to me. They do not knock on the door every five minutes but do look out for me and always ask after me if they haven't seen me about. Well I have gone on a bit again this month and I know that people will have different views on the matter but I can only talk about my feelings. If you read our local papers compare them with others across the country. They also believe in the community we live in, and the people. That to goes a long way. It's the big 60 for me this month. I put that in just in case anyone wants to send a card full of twenty pound notes! Finally can I say a big thanks to the Council Gardens and Parks for sorting out a problem we have been having with trees and grass over footpaths. I wonder could the finance department give them a bit more money to do the rest of the paths by cutting back grass off them, it looks so much tidier. We met at a dance hall in Croydon. I was besotted with her, (fool I know. But you know what happens fellas, they flash the eyelids and that is it). We got married in a place called Selsdon and had a big old fashioned knees up reception.

When we came to Basingstoke it was for a better life for our son, then our daughter, then another son.

All our children went to Chineham Park School, and every year we would help decorate the float for the Basingstoke Carnival. That was a great week, seeing how the people of Basingstoke came together. How proud we were if they won, and even if they didn't seeing people having a great time, and us of course.

I would dress up as Father Christmas for them and give the kids presents at Christmas, and go to see the nativity plays. Again, to see how proud of the little ones the mums and dads were. All our children went on to John Hunt all achieving the best they could do. The teachers worked hard to get the best out of them. My eldest son went on to London University and got his degree, my daughter went to college, did her NNEB and became a nanny, and my youngest son, who does so much to help me, went to college and became an electrician. He has gone on to gain many other qualifications as well. He is our handyman, he puts down floors, fits kitchens, fits bathrooms, decorates and so on.

When I left school I went to Brixton College and did mosaics, creating some lovely murals across the country in churches and buildings. I loved that but this became a very expensive job and so now you do not see many about doing this work.

When I came to Basingstoke I was a tile fitter and after a few years I was made redundant. I went to work for the hospital as a porter and I loved every bit of the job. 
