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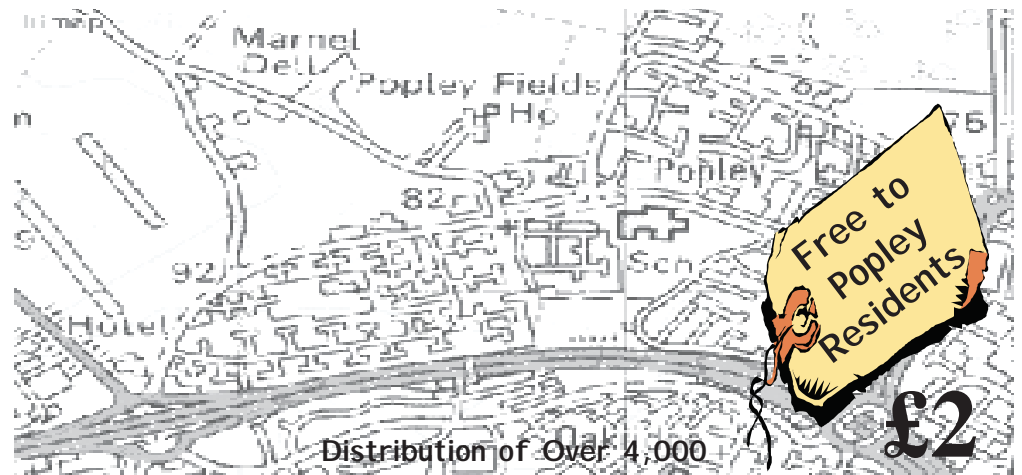

We help people get fair treatment, and inform them of their rights we aim to empower the client so that they can help themselves, we also help with letters, complete forms, represent clients and negotiate on their behalf.

## Basingstoke CAB Outreach

Our outreach service in Popley operates on a Monday afternoon from 1pm-3:30pm at the Bermuda Practice, Shakespeare House Health Centre, Shakespeare Road, Popley.



The credit crunch is hitting us all hard, in many areas of our lives. Here's a short guide to how it might be affecting you, and how we can help.

**JOB AT RISK** – More and more people are being made redundant. If this is happening to you, there are laws governing what your employer can and can't do in these situations. If you have worked for your employer for two years, you should get statutory redundancy pay; your contract may state you are entitled to more, so always check it. If your employer asks you to reduce your hours, this is a variation to your contract and needs to be agreed by both sides. If you can't agree, seek advice, either from the CAB or your union rep.

**CLAIM THE RIGHT BENEFITS** – Many people at work don't claim their full benefit entitlement, because they don't know what it is. You may be entitled to Working Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit, even Housing Benefit and Council Tax Benefit. If you're not working, there are a range of benefits to be claimed, such as Job seeker's Allowance or Employment and support Allowance. You can claim them by phoning your local benefits office, or by going online to [www.direct.gov.uk](http://www.direct.gov.uk)

**DEAL WITH DEBT** – here are some tips to help you cope with rising debt:

- Don't ignore the matter – talk to your creditors about your financial problems
- Get free advice – organisations like CAB can help you. Try our website [www.adviceguide.org.uk](http://www.adviceguide.org.uk) for some help.
- Pay your priority debts first – these are debts that affect your home, your liberty, your fuel supply or goods on hire purchase, things like your mortgage or rent, your council tax and your utility bills.
- Pay what you can each month – work out what you've got coming in and what's going out, and what you can therefore afford to pay to creditors.
- Don't take out more credit – you will only get into more debt.
- Facing possession proceedings? Don't panic. Go to court and make yourself heard.

Basingstoke Citizens Advice Bureau can help you with all these things, and a good first step is to check out the CAB website [www.adviceguide.org.uk](http://www.adviceguide.org.uk). We operate our drop-in service 10-3.30 Monday – Friday (except Thursday, which is 9.30 – 11.30) and Saturday mornings from 10-12. We can also offer appointments.

## Collect your 2009 travel tokens now

Residents eligible for assisted travel will be collecting their travel tokens from venues across the borough over the next two months.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council has set up 33 different distribution centres so that most people will be able to collect their tokens near to where they live.

The token allocation for this year is £53 per person. Of the borough's eligible residents, 75 per cent have selected the tokens option in preference to the national bus pass scheme.

The tokens supplement for residents who are disabled, who are in receipt of council tax or housing benefit, or are 75 years old or older is now £21.

To be eligible for assisted travel, residents must either be aged 60 or be a disabled person over five-years-old. Under the scheme, eligible people can opt to take either a national bus pass or travel tokens. The national bus pass offers free travel at any time within this borough and is available to all eligible local residents. Residents who chose the travel tokens option rather than the bus pass option received their renewal notices in January.

Disabled people, those over 75 years old and those living in rural areas are entitled to send their form back in the post so that their tokens can be posted.

All other eligible residents can collect their tokens at a venue near to where they live - usually a village hall or community centre. They can go to any issue centre to collect their tokens, but they must take their completed application form with them.

If a resident wants to nominate someone else to collect their tokens on their behalf, they can write a letter of authorisation advising the council of who this will be and attach it to their renewal form.

Cabinet member for Planning and Infrastructure Horace Mitchell said: "We have made the process as easy as possible. New applicants who bring along two forms of identity, confirming date of birth and residence, will be able to register for the first time. Anyone wishing to change from tokens to a bus pass can have the photographs needed for a bus pass taken at their nearest venue. Alternatively, they can send a passport-sized photograph back to the council along with their form."

All new bus pass requests will be sent out during the last week in March and are valid from 1st April 2009 until 31 March 2010. Existing bus pass applicants will not be sent an application form this year because their current bus pass will not expire until 31 March 2010.

Any existing bus pass applicant who is entitled to a travel token supplement, either because they are disabled, or receiving housing benefit or council tax benefit, will receive this by the end of February.

Anyone who misses the dates that a venue is open near to where they live will still be able to apply for their tokens at Parklands reception at the Civic Offices, but not before 6 April 2009.

People who apply later than July will only receive a proportion of the annual tokens allowance, depending upon exactly when they apply.

# Julie's Gardening Tips

What a month we just had! I doubt any of us got chance to get out in the garden apart from to clear away the snow and ice. Try and avoid walking on lawn areas while it is frosty or covered in snow as it will kill areas of grass off and leave bare patches. I notice the shops are now gearing up for the summer season and gardening supplies are becoming easier to get hold of again. I was surprised to see seeds at 28p a pack in a supermarket near the fire station (I won't name them here), worth a look if you aren't looking for fancy varieties of anything. Take advantage of the special offers whenever you can even if you can't really do much work on the garden yet. It will save money and time later. This is where good early planning comes in useful! It is chaos in my house at the moment. Some of you will know that I don't currently live on Popley, but I will be moving back in the next couple of months, so I am gearing up to move. One of my children has also a new home on Popley, so it will be a 'home-coming' for us. We will both have blank canvasses for gardens, so will be quite excited to get down to planning what we are going to do with them. The only thing I will be sorry about is that I couldn't move earlier in the year as my greenhouse will not be put to full use this season. I will have to lay the hard-standing before I can rebuild it, which will make it too late to sow many seeds for myself this year. I will probably buy a few packs of small seedlings available each year in a town centre store, and order some from seed catalogues. A few of the seed companies give vouchers with their catalogues and give free seeds too, they are worth requesting as this could be another way to save a few pounds, and give you some ideas. I know I have said it before, but don't be tempted to sow seeds too early. The pack will tell you the earliest and latest suitable dates. The earlier dates are intended for warm greenhouses in most cases, and windowsills are not suitable until later as the light is not strong enough to stop the seedlings getting very tall and straggly. This makes them weak, and most will die off before you can put them outside. If you don't have a greenhouse, and don't want to grow seedlings indoors, check out the local car boot sales for plants. They will be much cheaper than garden centres and you will get the opportunity to chat to the grower which is always a bonus. Allotments are difficult to come by, but if you have the knowledge and time to spare, it is worth looking into. I imagine many of us will start to think about growing more vegetables but suitable garden space may be a problem. You can get half plots if a full one would be too much. Contact Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council for more information. They will be able to tell you where there are available plots or how many are already on the waiting list for a site near your home. 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

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*Councillors Page:* February saw the yearly budget setting meetings for the year ahead The Police increase was 4.8% Fire Service 3.6% Basingstoke and Deane 3.5% and the County Council 1.9% (HCC for the next two years) The County was set at 3.5 but with the recession it was felt that with prudence it could be reduced to 1.9% with no loss of services, some due to government grants. One of the things, we in the Labour Group asked, and got, was an extra half a million to be put in for repairs and damage done to the environment, mostly roads and paths, by the weather. It was the worst for 18 years so needs extra consideration. Much more needs doing to our paths as HCC are ranked the lowest in the country and this needs sorting now, and we have been told this will definitely be done.

Some good news, the temporary traffic lights and Electric company works in Popley Way should finally be going, then it's a case of clearing up and re landscaping. Aldermaston Roundabout is near completion. I hope we have some kind of ceremony to celebrate that it is done. As a victim of a car accident on that roundabout I hope it will be a lot safer to drive around?

I went to the Sherborne St John's Parish meeting, as I normally do, with the good news that I have identified there may be a safe route from the village to Everest College and into town for pedestrians. We have agreed to work together. My final good news is that Everest is now doing so well that it is over subscribed, our children will be getting an excellent chance of a better education. **Popley West:** I have requested a salt bin to cover the bungalows in Glastonbury, Melrose Hall and the Abbey Road shops as there is the vital Post Office and Pharmacy there. We did ask that Magnolia Court got salted in that awful weather, and it was done. Extra gritting was done on the priority roads in Popley, but with the exceptional weather it did not work as well as normal. The paths were treacherous and a nightmare for all who had to go out, but there was not the manpower to cover the many miles of paths if it happens again they must be better prepared. There are lessons to be learnt by all, whether its one year or twenty. Salt Bins can be requested by us Councillors so we will be doing our rounds to check where they may be needed and that they fit the criteria to request. There is a survey that everyone is invited to make their comments about changes to the Community Wardens you can write or phone. The details are in the local papers and here in Popley Matters.

The borough council increase for council tax was set at 3.8%. None of the Labour Councillors voted for this increase when we know there is some sixty (yes 60) million pounds in reserves. It would not have eaten into the base amount, what was needed to reduce or cancel a raise would have been covered by the interest.

## **Have you Say on the future of Community Wardens.**

Residents are being urged to have their say on the future of community safety and development services in the borough as Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council considers proposed options for the service.

This is the second stage of a thorough review, which started in July last year.

Currently the council employs a team of eight community safety specialists, 20 staff in the community warden service and 10 community development specialists. Together they work in the community, and with the community, to tackle issues with anti-social behaviour and organise events to support the local people.

Among the options being considered are:

- Keeping the service the same
- Accrediting the current community wardens to give them enforcement powers
- Changing the role of the wardens to community development workers and funding a range of Hampshire County Council ACSOs (Accredited Community Support Officers) or Hampshire Constabulary PCSOs (Police Community Support Officers).

Three additional options will also be investigated:

- Continuing the existing warden scheme and adding additional community development staff
- A mix of wardens, ACSOs and PCSOs depending on need
- Community wardens tasked through intelligence rather than being based geographically.

Councillors, staff and people involved in community safety and development services have been invited to workshops to discuss the pros and cons of each of the options.

Cabinet Member for Community Safety and Development Cllr Clive Sanders said: "We need to ensure that the services we provide are right for residents' right across the borough.

"It is important to understand what the issues are and how we can work together to improve safety, however this does sometimes mean that we have to change the way we deliver services.

"We want your views on the options put forward so that they can form part of the final recommendations. The options are likely to vary as comments are taken on board, but will form a good basis for consideration."

All views need to be received by Wednesday 11 March so that officers can feed the responses into further recommendations.

A further report will go back to the Sustainable Communities Overview Committee on 1 April and then to Cabinet in May. A final decision is scheduled to be made in July by full council.

One of the biggest talking points over the last month has been the weather and it has affected us just as much as it has affected you. With the adverse weather brings added problems for the emergency services. Apart from the obvious problems on the roads, it brings an added dimension on a local level. Even we struggled to make it into work on some days. Due to the state of the local pathways and roads we were unable to use our bikes

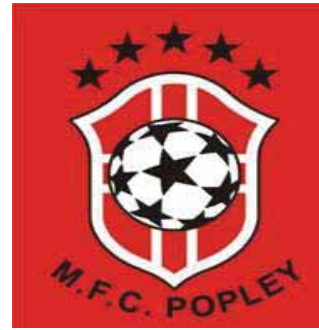
that many of you normally see us on. Instead we were walking the beat which actually brought a welcome break. We ended up dealing with nuisance youths throwing snowballs anywhere and everywhere. Thankfully I am not aware of any major damage caused and the majority of youths were well behaved as they often are. It is, as usual, just the minority that spoil it for the rest. Walking the beat with the snow was a more pleasurable experience than I thought it would be. The few that dared to venture out were very good humoured and looking back I rather enjoyed the snow.

Many of you will be well aware of the Constabulary's operation to combat burglaries, Operation NEMISIS. We have been heavily involved with the operation in Popley. We had a spate of burglaries before Christmas but thanks to our hard work and some pro-active arrests from PC THORNE and other officers burglaries in the area have dropped off significantly in the last 2 months. I would still remind you to be vigilante and report any suspicious activity no matter how minor you think it is. Remember if it doesn't seem right it probably isn't and we will be more than happy to respond. If you still have last months copy of the magazine, please remember PCSO RAPLEY's advice about home security.

Myself and PCSO RAPLEY recently attended Everest Community College to deliver that FAKE initiative with a colleague from the Constabulary's firearms section. FAKE means Firearm And Knife Education. It is an initiative that sees us go into schools throughout the county and deliver a presentation to students about the dangers of carrying firearm, imitation firearms and knives. Everest is the first school in Basingstoke to receive the presentation. Popley and Basingstoke as a whole, thankfully does not have a major problem with gun and knife crime. We also conducted a walk around at lunch time. The students behaved extremely well throughout the day. From what I have seen since the school opened it is an absolute credit to Popley and reflects extremely well on the community it serves.

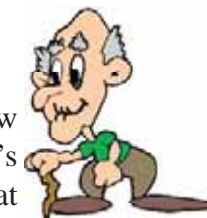


Pebbles Children's Centre provides Family Sessions where parents can share a range of activities with their babies and small children in a safe and relaxed environment.

I am sure that many retired people out there would be willing to make nest boxes for the Popley area? Even other parts of the town could benefit if they were to buy them from us. 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## SHERBORNE ST. JOHN PARISH COUNCIL

As I write this report there is still snow on the ground in Sherborne St John. The harsh weather took many of us by surprise and our pavements and side roads have been extremely slippery and dangerous. The freezing weather resulted in black ice at the entrance to the Chute recreation ground car park. The Parish Council have ordered a permanent gritting salt bin for this location and once in place will request that Hampshire County Council (HCC) replenish this bin and the one in Dancers Meadow.

Despite the additional concerns for immediate friends and family during the big freeze it was good to hear stories of parishioners making regular contact with their retired and less able neighbours, ensuring they were warm and well supplied. Thanks to all those who made special efforts to help those around them.

The Parish Council are concerned for the safety of school children who make their way on foot to Everest Community College as there have been reports of children using a slippery grass bank which runs alongside Chineham Lane to access a footpath. The clerk has written to HCC, BDBC and the school to highlight this potential danger.

Three quotes for the purchase of a Speed Indicator Device have been received. Typically, each quote is different and difficult to compare in order to recommend the best choice. In view of the importance of this equipment and the cost involved councillor Ashley has offered to investigate further with a view to making a recommendation at the next meeting.

The old notice board attached to the wall in the village square is long due for replacement. However we have had difficulty procuring a suitable alternative due to the depth of a standard notice board and constraints of a narrow pavement. The Clerk has approached a local carpenter to design and make a replacement instead.

We continue to chase the authorities to attend to the drains and gullies at Dancers Meadow and Vidlers Farm. The Clerk has also pointed out the considerable dangers from speeding cars and pot holes on Chineham Lane but to date (mid February) no response from HCC has been received.

Following a request for 'low step' buses at the December Open Forum the bus company advised that from the second week in January most buses will be 'low step' – with the occasional double-decker. Please let us know if this is not the case.

There have been more complaints of dogs fouling the entrance to the Church Path cemetery. The Parish Council is installing an oak fence and double gates to close the gap to the cemetery by the end of March. The lychgate will be completed with a roof over the gates during the next financial year. It is intended that the design and materials will compliment the existing lychgate at the entrance to the church graveyard.

Mark Smith our village bobby has advised us that he will be retiring at the end of February. He was unable to confirm the name of his replacement. Our thanks to Mark for his hard work and efforts on behalf of our community helping to keep Sherborne St. John a safe place to live. *Chris Cooke, Vice Chairman*

Work to set up a residents' group for the Popley Poets is underway.

Sentinel Housing Association has teamed up with Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council to gather ideas on further initiatives that improve the quality of life on the Poets estate.

With the new £15m regeneration of Longfellow Parade due to complete in 2010, and the new shops soon to open in Shakespeare Road, the opportunity will be for everyone living there - not just Sentinel residents, but homeowners and private renters too.

Sentinel and the Council are organising an event in March to get the ball rolling, with a view to launching a Popley Poets Resident Group in the spring.

## Home Electrical Safety.

In most homes today you will find a huge selection of electrical equipment such as TVs, DVD players, Stereos and Computers to name a few. If these items are not designed to be left switched on (i.e. Fridge, freezers etc), always switch them off last thing at night, don't leave Televisions, stereos on standby.

Do not overload electrical sockets and ensure that all plugs are fitted with the correctly rated fuse.

-  When buying electrical garden or DIY tools, look for the British Standard kite mark.
-  Check cables and flexes regularly for frays, kinks and bared wires.
-  Check plugs to make sure they are firmly wired and not damaged.
-  Replace damaged flex or plugs.
-  Use a Residual Current Device (RCD) or Power Breaker on all appliances.
-  Fully unwind extension leads before use.
-  Do not overload plug sockets.
-  Isolate electrics before changing bulbs or cleaning appliances etc.

## Merton Rise and the “Credit Crunch” - Update

As we approach the end of the outline planning consents for these sites (I can hardly believe that 5 years has gone by...), it seems timely to provide you with a further update on the County Council’s flagship project.

Since the opening of Everest Community College in 2007, we have continued to make good progress implementing the advance servicing and highways arrangements, and the completion of the final part of the Spine Road is programmed for April this year. In addition, two of the strategic park areas within Merton Rise have been completed, with the play equipped area adjoining the first phase of housing located on Banbury Way has been opened and will shortly transfer to the Borough Council for future management/maintenance.

However, the observant amongst you will have notice that progress on the wider development has slowed down. The problems occurring in the wider economy and the decline in the housing have made it difficult to achieve development of an appropriate quality. Potential purchasers have either withdrawn altogether or significantly reduced their financial offers to unacceptable levels. At a meeting last month, County Council Members agreed that it would not proceed on the basis of heavily discounted bids and that in the short term it would not proceed with the sale of any further phases of development on Merton Rise.

The consequences of this decision are many and varied but may include the need for a new planning and disposal strategy for the site that would allow marketing to re-commence when housing market shows some sign of recovery. In the short term there will be no further houses built on Merton Rise beyond those under construction by Miller Homes and Taylor Wimpey in Phase 1.

Although this is an inevitable outcome of the economic downturn, it is still incredibly disappointing given all of the hard work undertaken to date and also the local community expectations of new housing and other facilities being available. On the positive side, when the housing market does recover the site is “ready to go” as all of the servicing works will be completed, and

all of the necessary site investigations have now been undertaken.

In the meantime, many of you will be wonder how we intend to secure the site. Until further notice we do not intend to open up any more of the Spine Road to public use. This means there will no link from Don Allen Drive either to the A340 or through to Banbury Way. Whilst this may frustrating for some, this strategy is intended to prevent further itinerant occupation similar to that experienced last year. We will also be installing appropriate fencing and/or bunding along the most vulnerable boundaries of the site, to prevent either vehicular access or to discourage access into the site on foot.

Given this change of direction for the project, we are taking time to “take stock” and I would hope to be able to provide you with a more positive update later in the year once we have concluded discussions with the Borough Council and also had the opportunity to assess the timing of a market recovery.

Time to call 999 for an ambulance if you spot any one of these signs.
